## 3rd Hospice Ride coming soon

The Third Annual Hospice Hundred, a bike riding event for the benefit of Hospice Saint John, will be back this year, bigger and better than ever.

More than 100 cyclists and hundreds of volunteers are expected to converge on Dallas Area High School, the starting point for the event, Sunday, July 28.

Participants will have their choice of a selection of routes—100K, 50K, or 20K—for a pedal-pumping, pledge-raising ride through the summer greenery of Back Mountain—all for a great cause.

The Hospice Hundred is the premier fundraising event for Hospice Saint John, an ecumenical program which cares for more than 120 terminally ill people and their families on a daily basis. These individuals, for whom all medical options have been exhausted, are cared for at home by family members with the gentle, compassionate and professional assistance of nurses, social workers, chaplains and volunteers of Hospice Saint John.

The cause, as well as the unique nature of the ride, is what attracts riders from throughout the re-

gion, said Diane Myers, Director of Development for Lutheran Welfare Service of Northeastern Pennsylvania, owner and operator of non-profit Hospice Saint John.

"Some of the cyclists ride because a dying friend or loved one is a Hospice Saint John patient. Others join in because a family member was cared for by compassionate teams from Hospice Saint John. Others ride because they enjoy cycling, reaping the added benefit of knowing they are helping a great cause," Mrs. Myers explained.

Rev. Calvin O. Goerdel, President/CEO of Lutheran Welfare Service, said the event, designed to help the dying, has taken on a life of its own.

"Hospice Saint John means so many things to so many people in the 10 counties that make up northeastern Pennsylvania. If you consider friends, loved ones, family and neighbors, I do not believe there is anyone in the region who has not been touched by Hospice Saint John," said Rev. Goerdel.
