

## B-2A bomber will fly over

Barry Centini, Airport / Air Show Director, announced confirmation from the Department of Defense for a flyover of the B-2A "Spirit" Stealth Bomber as a part of Armed Forces Air Show '96 to be held on Aug. 17 and 18 at the airport. The exact time for the flyover appearances will be announced closer to the Air Show dates, but it will consist of multiple low level passes over the airport and the Luzerne and Lackawanna community

With four jet engines mounted on top and a two man crew, it has an unrefueled range of 6,300 miles.
