60 Years Ago - Aug. 21, 1936 BEE STING CLAIMS LIFE OF HUNTSVILLE MAN

Within about 30 minutes after a bee had stung him on the top of his head, Lewis Culp, 48, of Huntsville, expired at home Monday morning. An earlier experience, it is said, had warned Culp against his peculiar reaction to bee stings. Apparently he was aware of the seriousness of his condition for he mentioned to his wife that perhaps he should be taken to the hospital. She summoned neighbors, but before a doctor could be called, Mr. Culp passed away.

Another lovely farm was added to Senator A. J. Sordoni's rapidly expanding estate at Harveys Lake this week when the Senator purchased the old Mayer farm in Lake Township from Bertha P. Conyngham for \$20,000. The acquisition brings the total acreage of Senator Sordoni's property to about 1,400 acres. 50 Years Ago - Aug. 23, 1946 LEHMAN NAMES IDE FIRST POLICE CHIEF

Efforts of many Lehman Township residents to create an active effective police force were rewarded Wednesday evening when the organizational meeting of Lehman Township Police Association was held in Lehman High School. The previous system of policing the township had proved inadequate. With part of Harveys Lake and Lake Silkworth under his jurisdiction, Chief Joseph Ide could not do a thorough job with the force at his disposal. Under the new system members of the force are located in all sections of the township and will be available when Chief Ide needs assistance.

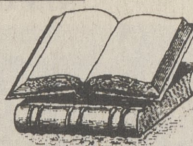

20 Years Ago - Aug. 19, 1976 SHAVERTOWN SCHOOL SOLD TO DALLAS MAN

A building permit issued to Gerald Lieberman to erect a double dwelling on land at 64 Pinecrest Ave., Dallas, was revoked by Dallas Borough Council at their meeting Tuesday. Leroy Roberts, building inspector, stated that on July 26, he improperly issued a building permit for the double dwelling on what he later learned was an undersized lot. He recommended that the permit be revoked as it was not in conformance with the building code.

Sale of Shavertown Elementary School for \$102,100 to William J. Powell, Dallas was approved by Dallas School Board of Directors at a special meeting Aug. 16 at the high school. The Board also stipulated that proceeds from the sale will be used for capital expenditures, a change from the time of the original plan when proceeds were needed to balance the budget. Directors said they have no idea what the buyer plans to use the property for and have no intention of trying to find out since use was not mentioned in the specifications.

LIBRARY NEWS

The Back Mountain Memorial Library has just completed another record-breaking July. The 50th annual library auction was a tremendous success, with good weather, and many items for auction. The crowds were more than willing to pay the price for the item they wanted. The net profit should prove to be a substantial figure to add to the operating budget.

Another July record breaker is always the children's story hours and the summer reading program. July is always the month that we set records in circulation figures. July of 1996 the total circulation was 9,829: adult, 4,766 and juvenile 5,063. Reference questions totaled 412; Book Club circulated

172; Interlibrary loan was 58, CDs 99, audio tapes 441 and videos 319. Total books added 217; books withdrawn 569; new borrowers 137, re-registrations 279. The 9,829 circ was the highest since 1992.

New books at the library: "Prayers for the Dead" by Faye Kellerman has Peter and Rina enmeshed in a web of greed, passion and terrible truths. The brutal murder of celebrated heart surgeon Azor Sparks brings with it shock, public outrage, and a demand for answers.
