'Joseph' coming to Cultural Center

Andrew Lloyd Webber's new production of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" will make its Northeastern Pennsylvania premiere at the Scranton Cultural Center for eight performances Oct. 8 through 13.

The production is being presented by Manuel Levine in association with the Broadway Theater League. Levine brought "Cats" to the Cultural Center last February, which set a house record for ticket sales.

"Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" opened on Broadway at the Minskoff Theater on Nov. 10, 1993.

The play is a joyous musical retelling of the

Biblical story of Joseph and his 11 brothers at the time of the Pharaoh. The score blends popular song with varied styles such as country and western, Calypso, French chanson and 50s and 60s rock 'n roll.

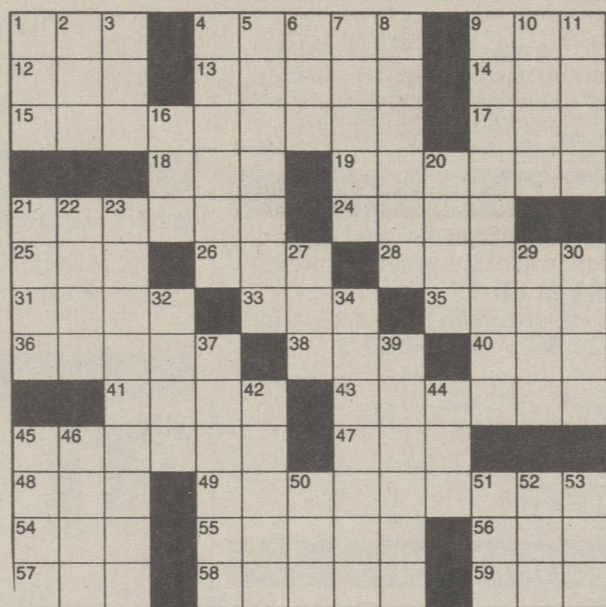
