7 youths charged in pair of Kunkle burglaries

DALLAS TOWNSHIP - Burglary charges have been filed against Dallas Township resident Charles Sabulski, 18, and Shavertown resident Steven Tomasura, 18, in connection with burglaries September 6 and 12 in Kunkle, which netted about \$13,000 in cash,

jewelry and electronics. Five male juveniles — a 14-year-old from shavertown, a 16-year-old from Dallas Township, a 15-year-old from Shavertown and two 15-year-olds from Trucksville - have been petitioned to Luzerne County juvenile court in connection with the crimes.

According to investigating officer Jeff Dennis, Tomasura and the 16-year-old and 14-year-old entered the Bittner residence through an unlocked entry door leading into an open garage bay September 9 between 9 a.m. and noon. Sabulski later picked them up in a car.

The suspects had called the home first from a pay phone to make sure no one was there, Dennis said. The trio allegedly

took approximately \$12,000 in jewelry and electronic equipment, including a six-disc CD player, a cordless telephone and two VCR's.

"The juveniles skipped school to commit the crime," Dennis said. "They spent the rest of the day selling the stolen items in Wyoming, Edwardsville and Wilkes-

Police recovered the electronic equipment and one necklace, a gold-tone Vchain set with cubic zirconia, which ironically turned out to be costume jewelry. Dennis said he had received an anonymoustip that a female Dallas High School student was wearing a piece of the stolen jewelry. She gave it to police and said she had received it from another student who had purchased it from one of the sus-

The investigation of the September 6 burglary led police to the second, which occurred September 12 at the Kosak residence in Kunkle

Sabulski, the 16-year-old Dallas Township juvenile, the two 15-year-olds from Trucksville and the 15-year-old from Shavertown are accused of entering the home through a set of French doors leading to a patio at the back of the home.

911 will require new names for some roads

BACK MOUNTAIN - With the county 911 emergency dispatch system expected to go on line next year, municipal officials are faced with many duplicate and similar street names which could confuse police and emergency per-

The entire system will be based on addresses, which can be confusing for responders in areas having duplicate street names. Each municipality must decide if it wants to change any street names. House numbers are assigned by the post office.

The Harveys Lake Borough council has taken the bull by the horns and approved the renaming of 18 streets, many of which were duplicated throughout the area, at its September 17 meet-

According to Dallas Township secretary Glenn Howell, the supervisors may consider renaming

Bus driver, motorist cited in Shavertown accident

KINGSTON TOWNSHIP -

Charles Bellas, 69, a school bus driver with Emanuel Bus Lines, has been charged with failure to stop and give information after being involved in an accident and leaving the scene of an accident in connection with a September 10 accident on Lehigh St

Both charges are third-degree misdemeanors, the lowest level, punishable by a fine of no more than \$2,500 or up to a year in prison. Emanuel Bus Lines is the transportation contractor for the Dallas School District.

The school bus which Bellas was driving was hit in the rear end on Lehigh Street September 10 by

a 1988 Oldsmobile sedan driven by Linda Ann Myslinski, 34, of Shavertown. Her car went underneath the back of the bus after the impact. She was cited for following too closely.

Bellas later told police he had stopped on Lehigh St. because a car ahead of him had stopped to make a left turn onto Stang St.

Neither Myslinski nor her two children, passengers in the car, were injured.

After the accident Bellas drove the bus and its 56 passengers to the Westmoreland School, where the children attend classes, after telling Myslinski he had to "get the children to school on time, according to investigating officer
