

Working in the trees at PSU

Did you know that new OSHA standard 1910.333 requires tree workers to receive documented electrical hazard training when working on trees that are within 10 feet of any energized line (including secondary electric service, cable and telephone lines)? Did you know that failure to comply could mean a possible \$70,000 fine and/or a year in jail? Did you know that trees should be pruned according to National Pruning Standards outlined in ANSI A300?

If you own or work for a tree service, landscape contractor, or municipality that occasionally prunes trees, join ISA certified arborists from the region and the state on Nov. 21, for a seminar entitled "Working in the Trees". The seminar will be held at the Penn State Wilkes-Barre Campus in Lehman.

A portion of the program will address safety issues, aerial res-

cue and new OSHA standards that requires tree trimmers to be trained and certified to recognize electrical hazards.

Also to be presented is a visual orientation of the ANSI A300 pruning standards and a discussion of worker's compensation and liability insurance coverage for tree care companies.

This program is sponsored by Penn State Cooperative Extension, Department of Conservation and Natural Resources-Forestry, USDA Forest Service, the Pennsylvania Urban & Community Forestry Council, the Northeast Pennsylvania Community Tree Association, and the Pocono Northeast Hardwood Association.

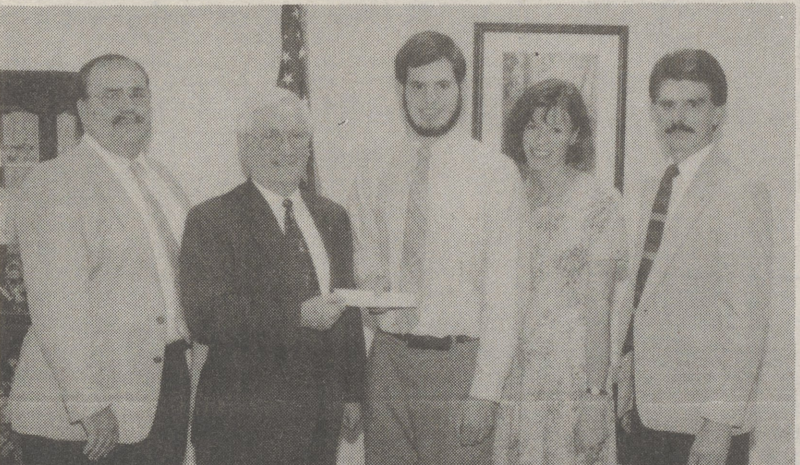
