expand," said Lloyd. "We are owned, managed and staffed by Back Mountain people. We are pleased to add jobs instead of taking them away."

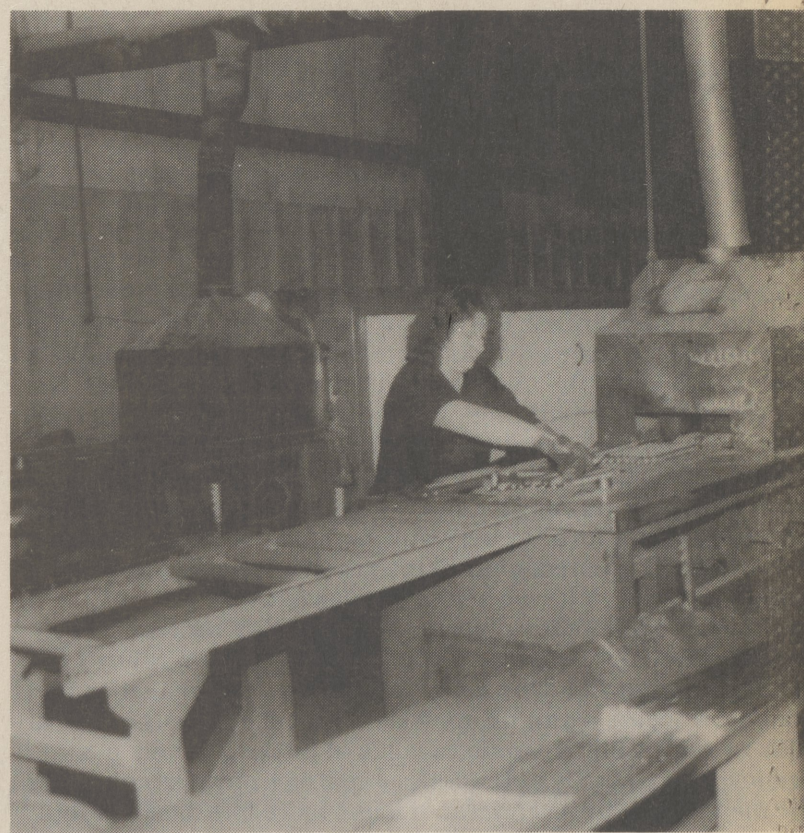
Lloyd opposed the 1994 North American Free Trade Agreement because he feels that it increases the chances of putting United States laborers out of work. But, ENCON has not been a casualty of the treaty. "We've been able to grow in spite of it," he said.

ENCON will knock out its back wall and push it back 50 feet in order to get the additional square footage. Recent weather conditions have slowed the process down he said. The developer had to put down rock due to all of the mud and puddles.

A new account and a new strategy led to the plant's expansion. "A new Canadian customer served as the straw that broke the camel's back," said Lloyd. Not only did ENCON get a new client, but also purchased equipment from the company to assist in the production of its products. "With all the new equipment we needed the space."

ENCON recently had to lower the floor about 20 feet to accommodate a new filling machine it purchased from the Canadian company.

Also, ENCON has adopted a new strategy over the last few years. "We found ourselves moving away from high volume heat-

ing for small appliances," explained Lloyd. "We refocused marketing into engineering oriented smaller volume applications." This marketing move has fared well for the company.

Lloyd credits the employees for

their hard work, keeping the company going strong. "The workforce here has a strong work ethic and brings an excellent attitude to work everyday." ENCON operates six days a week, 24 hours a day.

Q. What is a stone ground ski tune-up?
A: A properly tuned ski turns more easily, glides better and holds on ice better. In a tune-up the edges are sharpened, gouges in the base are filled and the skis are hot waxed. Stone grinding insures that the base is truly flat and only removes a minimal amount of material.
