Lehman 15, W.S. Tech 0



Scott Townsend picks Johns Hopkins

DALLAS - Dallas High School track and football standout Scott Townsend knew in January where he wanted to continue his academic and athletic careers. He made it official last week when he announced he would attend Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore.

"I visited there in January and met the coaching staff and some of the players," said Townsend, the 18-year-old son of Jeff and Lois Townsend of Orange. "Everything was right. I loved the campus, the school is near the top academically and I'll have the opportunity to play right away."

The successful mixture of academics and athletics has always been important to Townsend, who plans to major in biology at Hopkins before attending dental school.

"It's strange, but my best grades have always come during football season," explained Townsend, who is a member of the National Honor Society. "I guess it was because I knew I had to get things done and that helped me organize my time."

Dallas football coach Ted Jackson was also a motivational factor in Townsend's academic endeavors. "Coach Jackson has high expectations in the classroom for his players," said Townsend. "He emphasized academics.'

In addition to the Hopkins' excellent academic reputation, Blue Jays head coach Jim Margraff signed a five-year contract extension after leading the team to a 6-

3-1 record a year ago. So, the program appears to be on the rise and, in the day of merry-go-round coaching changes, verv stable.

"I like the fact that coach Margraff will be there for five more years," said Townsend. "The program was struggling when he took over and he really has turned things around."

A Wyoming Valley Conference All-Star, Townsend played guard and defensive end for the Mountaineers. He expects to concentrate on defense in college

"I'm happy that I'll be playing defense," said the 6-1, 260 pound Townsend. "I think my greatest strength as a player is my ability to read situations and adjust to various formations. I know what play to look for and let my teammates know.'

Besides serving as team captain on the Dallas football team, Townsend has been a standout on the track team, where he throws the shotput and discus. "The shotput is my best event," said Townsend, who finished third in the shot at the District II meet a vear ago
