## White Sox repeat as softball champs

The White Sox captured the Major League Softball championship with an exciting 8-7 win over the A's.

The White Sox took a 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first with a single by Sam Lloyd and a long home run by Lisa Wasser. Both teams scored two runs in the second to make it 4-2 in favor of the White Sox.

In the bottom of the third the A's came up with the defensive play of the game. With the bases loaded and no outs, Kelly Dougherty caught a line drive off the bat of Molly Guntli and relayed the ball home where Lauren Patton tagged out Sam Oschman. This kept the game close and when the A's exploded for five runs in the top of the fourth they led by a score of 7-4.

The White Sox regained the lead in the bottom of the fifth. The big hit was a single with two outs by Elise Persico which knocked in the tying and leading runs and the White Sox led 8-7.

The A's had a chance in the sixth with Cory Patton on second base with one out but pitcher Molly Guntli got the last two outs to preserve the victory.



## Legion team can score, but held back by pitching

**BACK MOUNTAIN** - This season's Back Mountain American Legion team can score runs, but is thin on pitching. The team, for which 18 players are selected from a tryout, has a 3-9 record as of June 28 and many of the losses have come in the later innings.

"We will get back Mike Woronko, who will add some stability to our pitching," said first-year manager Tom Evans, who has managed for many years at the Little League and Teener level. "He (Woronko) had missed three games due to UNICO practices. We lost two games this past week in the late innings because we just have not had enough pitchers to come into the game. It is hard to believe we scored 25 runs the past two games and we did not win."

BMT Legion dropped a 12-9 game to Nanticoke Saturday, as they again scored a bunch of runs but couldn't stop their opponents. Joe Halowich, Mike Woronko and Jason Perlis had two hits each, and Chad Sorber drove in two. Woronko took the loss, allowing eight runs in only two innings.

Aside from the pitching weakness, the team has some great baseball talent.

Ed Piekara, who will be a senior at Dallas this fall, is having a great summer thus far. "Eddie has hit the ball well and played tremendous defensively," said Evans. "He is one of our key pitchers and he also plays several other positions."

A trio of underclassmen — Chad Sorber, D.J. Kapson, and Jake Rambus — who should have Lake-Lehman back in contention next year, also have played well this summer "Sorber has played well as a middle infielder," remarked Evans, who is assisted by Lake-Lehman head baseball coach Chip Sorber. "Kapson has great natural talent and he is a smart player and stays focused," Evans said. "Rambus has hit the ball well too."

Another player Evans pointed out is Shippensburg-bound center fielder Joe Halowich. Halowich, who was one of the key players in Lake-Lehman's playoff team this season, is hitting in the leadoff spot for the Legion team. "He is an excellent leadoff hitter," Evans said. "He is a very smart base runner and steals bases with a great success rate."

Aaron Getz of Dallas is on the team for another season, and he is hitting well over .300 and holding down the hot corner. He will continue playing baseball at Alderson-Brodlus College.

Evans feels that American Legion baseball puts players at an advantage when it comes to the high school season next spring. "Obviously, the more you play the better you are going to be," he said.

The team plays a 20-game season in a league which includes 11 teams and each team plays each other twice. Making up the area where the team is selected are the Dallas and Lake-Lehman school districts and the age range of the players is 15-18.
