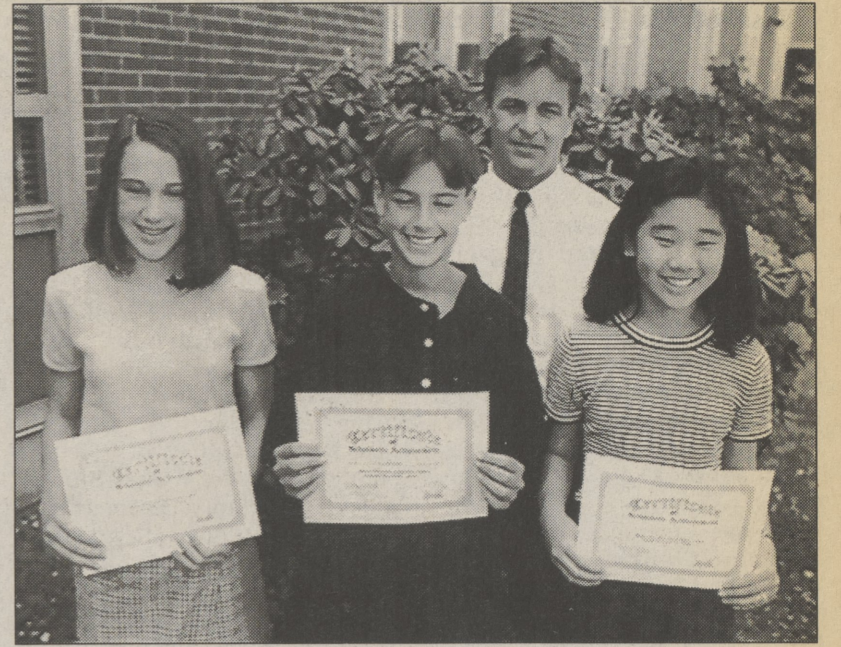

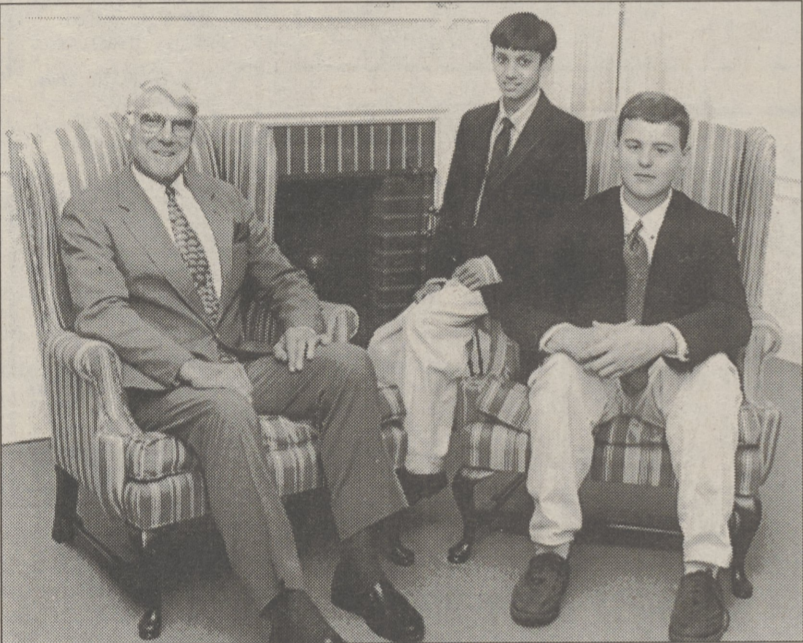

L-L district to hold meeting July 17

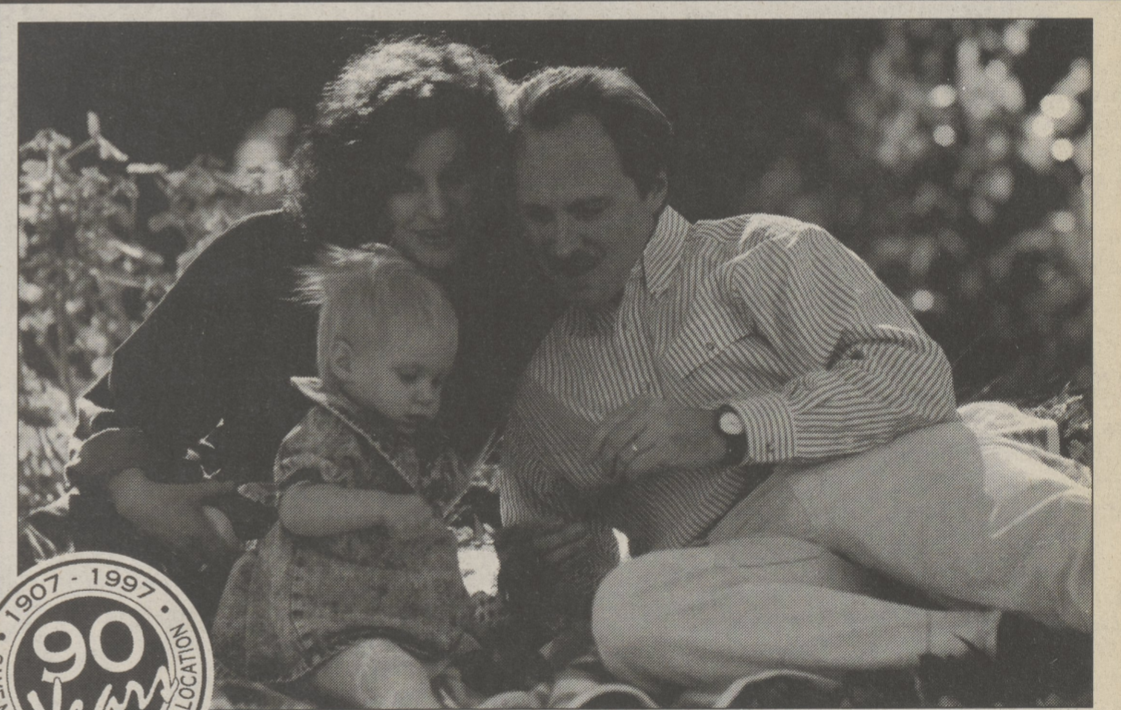
