



1997 deer license schedule

Luzerne County Treasurer Michael L. Morreale recently announced the 1997 antlerless deer license schedule. He advises all hunters to obtain their licenses as soon as possible. The schedule is as follows:

Thurs., July 31, Deadline to obtain Muzzleloader licenses. No more will be sold after this date.

Mon., Aug. 4, First day resident antlerless deer license applications will be accepted by the Treasurer's Office. (Mail Only)

Mon. Aug. 18, First day antlerless deer license applications accepted from non-residents and resident surplus (bonus) applications from Muzzleloader license holders. (Should any be left.) (Mail Only)

Qualified landowners may ap-

ply for an antlerless deer license at anytime prior to license sales to the general public

Very Important:

Morreale would like to remind all hunters that the cost of the antlerless deer licenses are still \$5.75. The price was not printed on this year's antlerless license application because it was not known if there would be an increase when the licenses were printed.

Because the allotment of licenses for Luzerne County has been decreased this year, Morreale is predicting that there will be no surplus (bonus) tags available for muzzleloader license holders. He suggests that hunters consider applying for bonus tags in other
