

Civil War Roundtable will meet Sept. 17

The Wyoming Valley Civil War Roundtable will begin the 1997-98 season with its first meeting on Sept. 17 at the Daddow-Isaacs American Legion, Route 415, Dallas, across from Picketts Charge Restaurant at 7 p.m. The program for the evening will be Civil War author Tom DeJardin who will be discussing his book "Stand Firm Ye Boys From Maine", the complete story of the 20th Main Regiment in the Gettysburg Campaign from June 21-July 10, 1863. DeJardin has studied the story since first visiting the battlefield at age 10.

The book traces the development of a legend as veterans of the fight tried to remember, understand and memorialize their part in the largest battle ever fought on this continent. The book also examines how modern historiography contributed to the legendary status of the fight.

Tom DeJardin was born and raised in Maine and received his bachelor's and master's degree from Florida State University. He did his doctoral work in History at the University of Maine and worked as an interpreter giving programs on the Gettysburg Battlefield for the National Park Service. A book signing will also take place.

The program is open to the public at a cost of \$3 for non-members.

DISTRICT COURT BRIEFS

Police say they caught man molesting 12-year-old boy

According to police reports, Robert Lee Holeman, 53, of 5 Shaver Ave., Dallas Twp., was caught in the act of sexually molesting a 12-year-old boy Sat., Sept. 6 at about 10:45 p.m.

Patrolmen Jeffrey Dennis, of the Dallas Twp. police, and Dave Rinehimer of the Dallas Borough police responded to a report of a disturbance outside the home. When they entered the home, Dennis and Rinehimer saw Holeman and the boy on a bed in the home's bedroom. After the victim ran from the room, Holeman resisted attempts by Dennis, Rinehimer and Kingston Twp. officers Frank Ziegler and Robert

Ibbotson to handcuff him.

The boy was taken to Nesbitt Hospital where Dr. John F. Devine confirmed he had been sexually assaulted. In testimony taken by Larry Fabian of the Luzerne County District Attorney's office, the boy said Holeman threatened to choke him if he made too much noise during the attack.

Holeman was arraigned before District Justice James Tupper, and faces 17 charges, including multiple counts for the alleged assault and one count of resisting arrest. He is being held in the Luzerne County jail in lieu of posting \$100,000 cash bail. A preliminary hearing is set for Sept. 16.

PLEADS GUILTY TO DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Tunkhannock resident Joseph Belcher, 21, pled guilty to disorderly conduct before District Justice James Tupper. He was arrested by Dallas Township patrolman Jeffrey J. Dennis July 5 after police responded to a disturbance near E. Center Hill Rd. and Midland Dr. Belcher and another man were fighting when police arrived. Belcher ran from police and attempted to escape them. Belcher's blood alcohol level was determined to be .150.

ASSAULT, OTHER CHARGES

Nanticoke resident Christopher Shone, 25, was arrested by Harveys Lake Borough patrolman James Karlowicz July 25 after police responded to a call at Desi's in Dallas. Shone was loud and unruly, police said.

He faces charges of simple assault, disorderly conduct, public drunkenness and possession of

drug paraphernalia after a hearing. Related charges of reckless endangerment, harassment and possession of marijuana were dismissed.

D.U.I. CHARGES

The following people waived their right to a preliminary hearing before District Justice James Tupper on September 4:

- Shavertown resident Michael Sheridan, 29, who was arrested by Dallas Township patrolman Jeffrey Dennis July 5 after police observed him driving erratically on Demunds Rd., Main Rd. and Overbrook Rd.

After failing field sobriety tests, he was taken to the Luzerne County DUI Center where his blood alcohol level was determined to be .158.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, not stopping at a stop sign and failing to keep right.

- Wilkes-Barre resident Kevin R. Murphy, 25, who was arrested

by Dallas Township patrolman Jeffrey Dennis July 7 after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 309.

After failing field sobriety tests, he was taken to the Dallas Township Police Station where his blood alcohol level was determined to be .213, more than twice the legal limit of .10.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and disregard for a traffic lane.

ALTERING INSPECTION STICKER

Luzerne resident James Simon, 32, who was arrested by Dallas Borough patrolman James Martin June 23 after he observed Simon had an expired inspection sticker, waived his right to a preliminary hearing. Upon closer inspection, Martin saw the sticker expired in March 1997. An eight was placed over the number three to make the inspection sticker appear valid.

He was charged with having an invalid inspection. A related charge of driving an unregistered vehicle was dismissed.

CRIMINAL MISCHIEF

Dallas resident William Samuel Charles, 33, who was arrested by Dallas Borough patrolman William Norris August 25 after Charles's mother came to the station to report that he threatened her after an argument, faces charges of possession of an offensive weapon, disorderly conduct and criminal mischief after waiving his right to a preliminary hearing.
