

Game Commission to give fall tours to nature lovers

Colorful foliage and the invigorating snap of mountain air are a part of the Game Commission's upcoming tours offered on select tracts of state game lands this fall.

The auto tours will give the public a rare peek at wildlife and management practices behind the gates of SGL 57 in Wyoming and Luzerne Counties, SGL 141 in Carbon County, and SGL 12 and 36 in Bradford County.

Game Commissioner personnel will be on hand to explain various points of interest, includ-

ing wildlife habitat improvements and local history.

The SGL 57 tour will meet at the Northeast Regional Office in Dallas, at the junction of Routes 415 & 118, between 9 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. on Sun., Oct. 12.

The tour route will encompass approximately 30 miles and take about five hours to complete. Four wheel-drive vehicles are strongly recommended.

Those participating in the tour are urged to bring a picnic lunch for a stop at a picturesque location along the route.

DISTRICT COURT BRIEFS

D.U.I. CHARGES

Dallas resident Jeffrey Piatt, 34, was arrested July 12 by Dallas Township patrolman Jeffrey J. Dennis after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 309 and Main Rd.

After failing field sobriety tests, Piatt was taken to the Dallas Township Police Station where his blood alcohol level was determined to be .113.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, failing to keep right and disregard of traffic lane. Piatt waived his right to a preliminary hearing before District Justice James Tupper.

Richford, NY resident David Earl Everidge, 38, was arrested Sept. 17 after Dallas Township police chief Wayman Miers saw his vehicle weave between lanes on Rt. 309.

After failing field sobriety tests, Everidge was taken to the Dallas Township Police Station where he refused to take a blood alcohol test. Refusal to submit to a blood alcohol test results in a one year suspension of a driver's license.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and disorderly conduct.

Dallas resident Scott Drasin, 27, was arrested Sept. 14 by Dallas Borough patrolman James Drury after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 415.

After failing field sobriety tests, Drasin was taken to the Dallas Township Police Station where his blood alcohol was determined to be .181.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and careless driving. He waived his right to preliminary hearing before District Justice James Tupper.

Pittston resident Richard White, 31, was arrested Aug. 7 by Harveys Lake patrolman James Karłowicz after White failed to stop for a marked stop sign.

After failing field sobriety tests, White was taken to Wilkes-Barre General Hospital where he refused to submit to a blood alcohol test. Refusal to take the test results in a one year suspension of a driver's license.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, failing to stop at a stop sign and driving with a suspended license. A related charge of careless driving was dismissed.

CREDIT CARD THEFT

Dallas resident James M. Setser, 19, pled guilty to theft by deception Sept. 29. Setser was identified as the person using Robert Fallon's GM credit card that was discovered missing Feb. 16 after Fallon received a call from the GM Corp. asking him if he was aware of \$2,096 worth of items purchased Feb. 15.

Setser used the card at the Sneaker King and Radio Shack stores in the Country Club Shopping Center in Dallas.

He was charged with theft by deception. Related charges of receiving stolen property, forgery and use of a stolen credit card were dropped.
