
Students attend leadership forum

Four Dallas High School students, seniors Jeff Faneck and Jason Vodzak and juniors Lacey Popson and Stephanie Potisek, recently attended the National Youth Leadership Forum on Medicine. The four joined 350 of the best and brightest young adults between the ages of 16 and 18, representing 47 of the 50 states and four foreign countries, for 11 days in Washington, D.C.

The participants were housed at Marymount University in Arlington, Virginia. There on campus, they heard from medical students, practicing doctors, HMO employees, and other medical professionals on subjects ranging from AIDS Awareness to smallpox eradication. They also had the opportunity to choose for themselves specialty seminars based on their own interests. In groups of approximately 22, the students completed projects concerning public health and problem-based learning, as well as an in-depth study of medical ethics.

Visitations to hospitals, clinics, research institutions, and Georgetown University Medical School gave them an idea of a typical day at each of these distinct facilities. Doctors were readily available for shadowing and questioning. The students observed firsthand how a heartbeat actually occurs and the equipment involved in procedures such as MRls.

The students also had time to visit the Capitol building, the offices of Congress, the Supreme Court, the National Zoo, historical monuments, Arlington National Cemetery, and the Smithsonian.
