Some oils include almond, olive, oak moss, vanilla, chocolate and patchouli. All of the oils are food grade, said Rigez. "When you are environmentally conscious (and use natural items) you can pronounce all the ingredients."

With bottles and bottles of oils, scents and flavors filling the cupboards around him, he experiments and creates new aromas. His passion for his craft is obvious as he excitedly passes rich scents under a visitor's nose.

At first glance he looks more like a man preparing a great meal than one making soaps, and the comparison is appropriate. A big pot sits on the stovetop with about six rectangular molds made out of cut drainpipe jutting up. After mixing and melting his ingredients, he pours them into a mold. When the whole foot of soap is solid, he takes it out of the mold and cuts it into smaller bars.

Rigez is right at home experimenting with scents and flavors in the kitchen. He was a chef for 30 years and owned the restaurant, Daniel's, in Scranton.
