## **Township applies for grant** for rec field, walking trail

JACKSON TWP. - As a result of last month's board meeting some changes may be in the works for Jackson Township's future.

On November 25, with the help of Back Mountain baseball and soccer supporters, the township submitted a grant application for a new baseball field and walking trail. The township may wait up to 16 months to hear whether or not their application has been approved for grant money from the Keystone Recreation and Parks Committee. If the project is approved, construction of the field and trails should begin in 1999.

Last month, resident Thomas Jenkins complained about current zoning ordinances when he was cited for non-compliance when he replaced a swimming pool liner without a permit. Because of his complaints and persistent requests for a review of zoning laws, "the zoning board requested deleting some existing laws pertaining to swimming pool repairs, porch roof maintenance

and other such minor maintenance repairs," said zoning supervisor Carl Aston.

The supervisors agreed to a review; however, chairman Walter Glogowski suggested the zoning board be more specific with an itemized list of exclusions to be proposed.

Jackson Township will be working in coordination with U.S. Congressman Paul Kanjorski on the Susquehanna/Lackawanna River Resolution. Kanjorski is aiming to have the Susquehanna and Lackawanna rivers included in a list of ten rivers named as American Heritage Rivesr. The Economic Development Council of Northeast Pennsylvania solicited each municipality for support and the supervisors decided to support the promotion of the rivers.

Supervisor John Wilkes, Jr. announced that Monday night's meeting was Walter Glogowski's last official meeting for the supervisory board. Glogowski will be serving as a alternate member for another panel. The next scheduled meeting is set for January 5, 1998 at 7 p.m.
