Blood supplies at externe low levels, donors needed

The hardest thing to find on the shelves this holiday sea-

son will be blood. Increased demand from area hosptials and three months of poor donor turnout has dropped the region's blood supply to near emergency levels, according to the American Red Cross Blood Services, Northeastern Pennsylvania Region.

"We're having a very difficult time keeping up with the demand," said Robert Bogdon, spokesperson for the American Red Cross Blood Services. "Over 100 units of blood were used by area patients just the other morning-nearly wiping out most of our inventory, particularly type O blood which is at less than a half a day supply

Bogdon said many patients who currently are in need of blood range from accident victims, patients suffering from severe burns and shock, premature newborns, cancer paing disorders and blood diseases.

The Red Cross has needed to import a great deal of blood from the National Red Cross blood inventory to keep area hospital patients alive.

"This is extremely serious," Bogdon stated. "We are thankful for all the donors who helped us out during our summer appeal. We are again running out of blood for patients and are asking you to continue to give blood during this busy holiday season.

The Red Cross is asking residents who are eligible to give blood to attend an upcoming bloodmobile or a donor station in their area to build up the blood supply for this holiday season.

Blood donors can locate a blood drive or a donor site in their area by calling 1-800-432-8045.

Blood donations tend to decrease during the holiday season, according to Bogdon and

Red Cross needs donors the most.

To donate blood, one must be 105 lbs. or more, age 17 or

over, and be in generally good health. "There is no age cutoff to give blood, but yous should be in good health," he added.

Bogdon also pointed out that some people who may not have been eligible in the past, may be eligible now. If you have any questions on your eligibility due to medical reasons, you may ask for the Red Cross Nursing Department at 1-800-432-8045.

"Any one of us at any time could have a serious accident, be in need of surgery, or contract a disease such as cancer or leukemia and need blood," Bogdon added.

The Red Cross Blood Center covers 19 counties in Pennsylvania and two in New York. Red Cross supplies blood and blood products to 41 area hospitals.
