clinical depression. Another tale tells of a successful architect and his wife who are suddenly confronted with their own mortality. The wake-up call arrives when he is diagnosed with cancer. And yet, another tale is of a World War II veteran who witnessed the horrors of the Nazi death camp at Buchenwald.

His observations are not of those of a persecuted holocaust survivor, but as a member of the victorious allied Army who liberated the camp.

The brutal lesson in human hatred he received has inspired him to fight racism for the remaining years of his life.


