

Black Knights in hunt for 4th consecutive title

LEHMAN - With at least a tie for a fourth consecutive Wyoming Valley Conference West Division championship almost secured, the Lake-Lehman High School wrestling team will soon be turning its attention to the post-season.

The Black Knights are 8-4 overall and 5-0 in the WVC West heading into Wednesday's showdown with Berwick. With a victory, Lehman would remain undefeated in the division with next week's match against Dallas the only division contest remaining. A Lehman loss to the Bulldogs would likely create a three-way tie atop the division between the Knights, Berwick and Pittston.

"We're thrilled to be in this position," said Lehman co-coach Phil Lipski. "It's exciting to have the opportunity to win a championship. The Berwick match is a chance to win the division and get us ready for the post-season."

Lipski and his partner, Tom Williams, are especially excited to be in this situation since they really didn't know what to expect at the beginning of the season. "We've already overachieved," said Lipski. "We thought we'd be good enough to beat the best teams in the league on any given night. But, we also thought we were weak enough to get upset some-

The upset came last Wednesday against Coughlin when the Knights lost on a tiebreaker after battling to a 33-33 draw. "Coughlin wrestled a tough match," said Lipski. "We had pulled out a few close matches earlier and this one just got away."

Lehman visits Towanda Friday, and will host state powerhouse Wyalusing Saturday, before concluding the WVC season against Dallas and Crestwood, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Then it's on to the post-season which begins with the District II Dual Meet Tournament, Saturday, Feb. 7. The Knights won the District Dual Meet title last year. "We're looking forward to defending our championship," explained Lipski. "Our goal, as always, is to win everything. It starts with the division crown and works up to states. The team tourney is a chance to achieve another goal."
