at CRI covers its sales, purchasing, production and customer service processes. This quality management system provides the basic tools for CRI to fulfill its commitment to meet the ever changing needs of its customers through continuous improvement of its products, service and technical support.

Quality improvement within the company has long been driven from the top by group Managing Director, Mike Cockett, and has received continued support at all levels of the organization. The coordinating of ISO9002 activities at CRI was undertaken by the Technical Manager, Tony Nickalls. On completion of this exercise he remarked that "It was hard work, but it has helped us in ways too numerous to mention. Things we thought we were doing beforehand, we are now actually doing".

Sales Co-ordinator, Tom Brody, explained - "At first I thought it was just a lot of hard work, but now we can trace what we've done and why we've done it. We are not just doing things by default"

Jim Collins, Financial Controller for CRI, summed up his thoughts of the ISO9002 system. "It provides the discipline needed for ongoing operating plans and keeps you on track. As a result of the ISO9002 sys-

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

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
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
