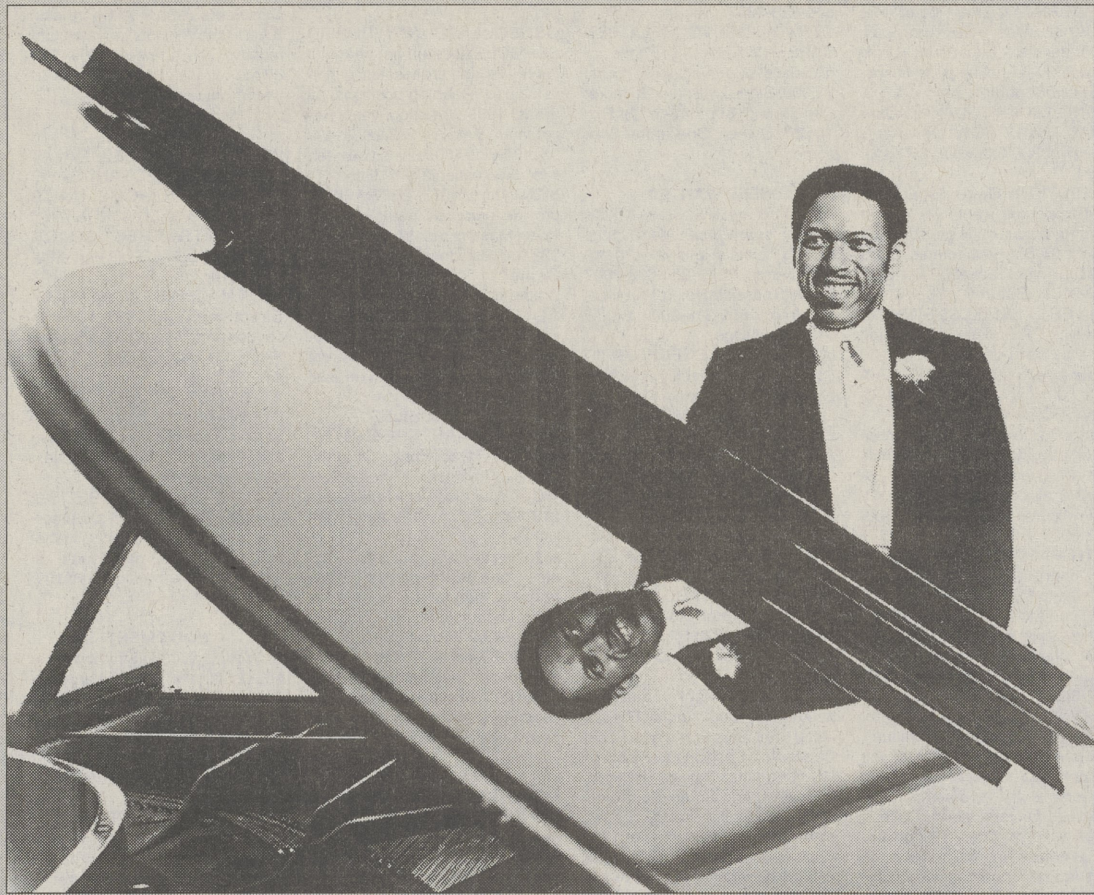

Famed pianist will perform at Penn State Wilkes-Barre

Noted concert pianist Raymond Jackson will perform at Penn State Wilkes-Barre Monday, Feb. 23, 7:30 p.m. in the Hayfield House Community Room on the campus in Lehman. The keyboard artist will present his standard classical repertoire along with a varied program of Black composers. The February program, which honors Black History Month, and is part of the campus' Cultural and Performing Arts Series, is free and open to the public.

A professor of music at Howard University, Washington, DC since 1977, Raymond Jackson has performed with symphony orchestras and as a solo artist in major concert halls in the United States, South America and Europe. Possessed of both a velvet touch and fingers of steel, he has attracted a large and dedicated following, not

Later, he graduated from the Conservatory of Music degree summa cum laude. He went on to earn bachelor's master's and doctoral degrees from the prestigious Juilliard School in New York City. His doctoral dissertation, entitled "The Piano Music of Twentieth Century Black Americans," is now a permanent part of the Juilliard library.

The pianist-educator has been a prize-winner in national and international piano competitions.

Dr. Jackson was the first African American, first musician and youngest person from his native state to be elected into the Rhode Island Heritage Hall of Fame, where he also is distinguished as an honorary member of the prestigious Chopin Club.

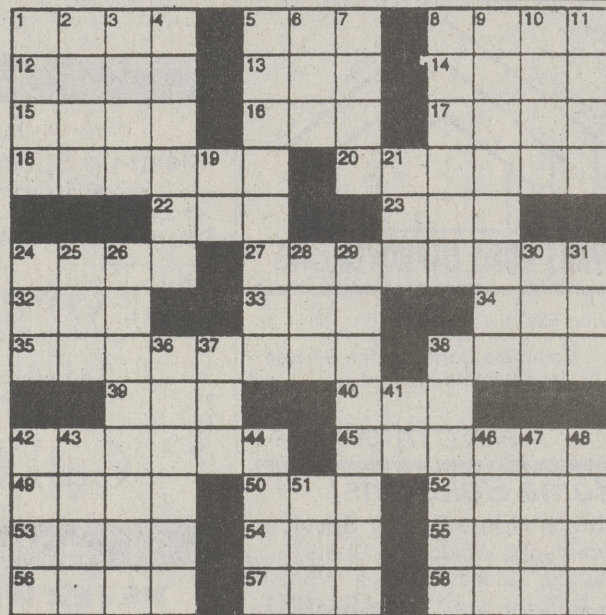
