## **Grant will help schools/police** fight for drug-free community

Kevin M. O'Connor, Executive Director, Luzerne Intermediate Unit, has received notification from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency that the "Part of Your Life" application submitted for funding under the Governor's Program of the federally funded Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities Act has been approved.

The "Part of Your Lfe" grant, a pilot school based program, is a collaborative effort between the Luzerne Intermediate Unit, Nonpublic School Services, Scranton Diocesan Schools, four local police departments including Dallas Twp. and four school districts including Dallas.

During the planning stages of the grant application there was a concern among the police chiefs that a need to reposture the negative image that many students

share of the roles and responsibilities of police officers should be addressed. The objective of the program is to create a relationship of trust through visibility and interaction with elementary and high school students.

The police officers will become an educational resources in the schools with classroom instructions that relate to law enforcement such as drivers education, truancy, in and out of school suspension, school drop outs, the abuse of drug and alcohol or other matters that student wishes to address in the classroom or privately.

"Part of Your Life" is a program designed to help promote a partnership between the schools, parents, and law enforcement and will bring into focus the role a police officer plays in everyone's life.
