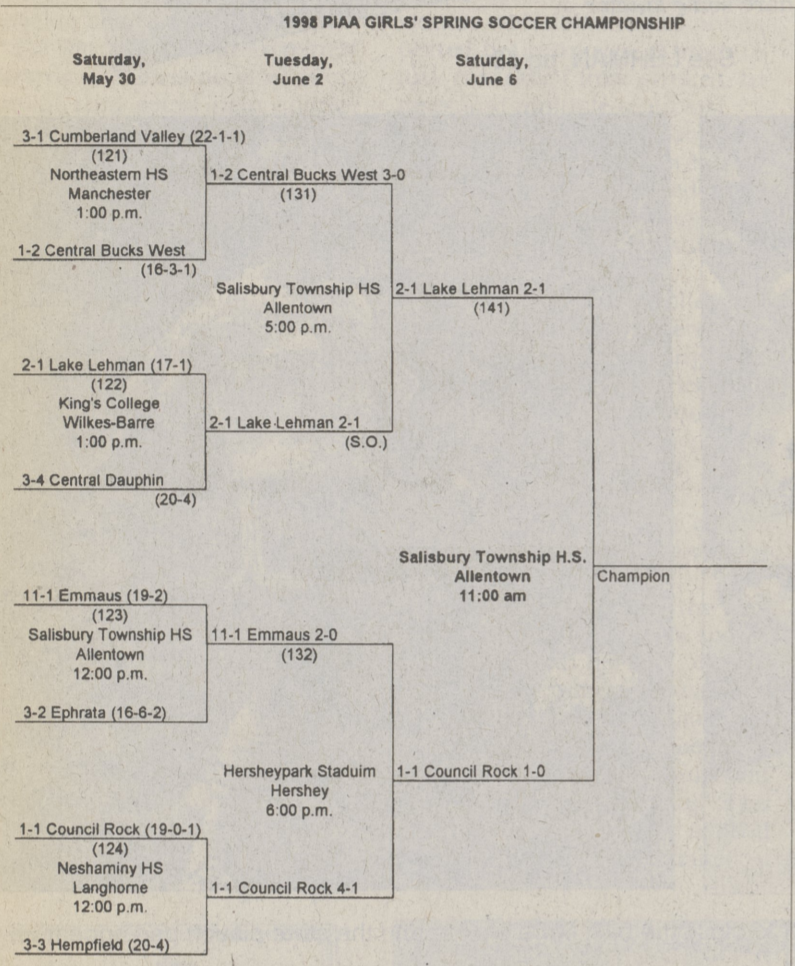
Spencer said, "I never expected to go this far, and I was proud that we did."
