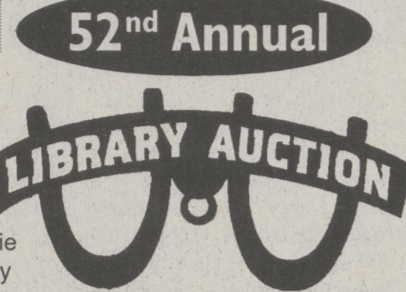


Library Auction Corner

DISTRICT COURT BRIEFS

Sticker stolen, papers altered, police charge

Larksville resident Fred Shupp, 50, was arrested April 1 by Dallas Borough patrolman James Drury after police observed that he had no validation sticker on his license plate. Back Mountain Communication Center informed police that Shupp's plate expired in 1994. Upon closer inspection of the vehicle, police noticed that his inspection sticker had been tam-

pered with. The serial number revealed that the sticker was one of many stolen from Biscontinini's in Kingston. Shupp was charged with altered, forged or counterfeit documents and plates, displaying an altered inspection sticker, receiving stolen property, driving an unregistered vehicle, unauthorized transfer of registration and driving without insurance.

D.U.I. CHARGES

Tunkhannock resident John Matthew Murray, 31, was arrested May 11 by Dallas Twp. patrolman Brian Feeney after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 309. Murray did not pull over when two officers signalled him, police said. Murray continued to drive on Rt. 309, swerving in and out of the lane. He turned onto Sago St. where police blocked his vehicle. He was taken to Wilkes-Barre General Hospital where he took a blood alcohol test. He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, fleeing or attempting to flee police, resisting arrest, failing to signal, careless driving and disregard for a traffic lane.

The following people waived their right to a preliminary hearing before District Justice James Tupper.

West Wyoming resident Grant Downs, 26, arrested April 5 by Dallas Twp. patrolman Brian Feeney after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 309. After failing field sobriety tests, he was taken to the Luzerne County DUI Center where his blood alcohol level was determined to be .125. Downs was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and exceeding the maximum speed limit by 14 mph.

Shavertown resident Kimberly Sorber, 26, arrested April 10 by Dallas Twp. patrolman Jeffrey Dennis after police observed her driving erratically on Rt. 309.

After failing field sobriety tests, Sorber was taken to Wilkes-Barre General Hospital where her blood alcohol level was determined to be .131. She was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and disregarding a traffic lane. A related charge of operating a vehicle without financial responsibility was dismissed.

Belair, MD, resident Thomas Walsh, 22, arrested April 26 by Dallas Borough patrolman James Drury after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 415.

After failing field sobriety tests, Walsh was taken to the Luzerne County DUI Processing Center

where his blood alcohol level was determined to be .192. He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol. A related charge of careless driving was dismissed.

Noxen resident Kimberly Giberson, 22, arrested April 25 by Dallas Twp. patrolman Jeffrey Dennis after police observed her driving erratically on Rt. 309.

After failing field sobriety tests, Giberson was taken to the Luzerne County DUI Processing Center where her blood alcohol level was determined to be .128. She was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol. Related charges of disregarding a traffic lane and failing to keep right were dismissed.

Dallas resident William B. Boyle, Jr., 27, arrested Feb. 6 by Dallas Borough patrolman James Drury after police observed him driving erratically on Rt. 309 and E. Center Hill Rd.

After failing field sobriety tests, Boyle was taken to Wilkes-Barre General Hospital where his blood alcohol level was determined to be .208, more than twice the legal limit.

He was charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, failing to yield to an emergency vehicle, driving at an unsafe speed and careless driving.

ASSAULT CHARGED

Nanticoke resident Brian Maslowski, 36, was arrested Feb. 9 by Lehman Twp. patrolman Sev Newberry after police were called to the residence of Lisa Maslowski and Gary Kosloski.

Kosloski told police that Brian Maslowski entered the home and dragged him out of his bed while he was sound asleep. Mr. Maslowski began pummeling him with his fists until Kosloski got a bat to defend himself, police reports said. Lisa Maslowski held Mr. Maslowski at bay while the police were called. Mr. Malowski fled the scene in his vehicle.

He was charged with simple assault, recklessly endangering another person, harassment and

disorderly conduct. A related charge of aggravated assault was dismissed.

PUBLIC DRUNKENNESS

Shavertown resident John A. Henry, Jr., 28, was arrested May 23 by Kingston Twp. patrolman Charles Rauschkolb after police were called to Burger King in Shavertown at 5:44 a.m. A second call was received at 6 a.m. informing police that Henry was beating on the back door demanding entrance.

He was charged with public drunkenness, resisting arrest and disorderly conduct. A related charge of terrorist threats was dismissed.

CORRUPTION OF MINORS

Harveys Lake resident Bruce Helms, 18, was arrested March 17 by Jackson Twp. patrolman Jerome Leedock. Helms was charged with corruption of minors for having consensual intercourse with a 14-year-old girl.

CAR CHARGED

Plains resident Brian James Langdon, 26, was arrested March 20 by Dallas Borough patrolman James Drury after Dallas Auto Rental, Inc. reported an automobile theft.

Langdon did not return a car on the designated date of March 12. He is charged with theft of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. Related charges of theft of leased property and driving while under suspension were dismissed.

BAD CHECKS

Trucksville resident Einat Davidowitz plead guilty to writing a bad check to Newell Fuel Service in the amount of \$333.39. He was charged March 19.

GUILTY PLEA TO MARIJUANA POSSESSION

Birchrunville, PA resident Brian Henry, 19, was arrested Jan. 23 by Dallas Twp. patrolman Wayman Miers after police were dispatched to McHale Hall on College Misericordia's campus.

When police arrived at his room they found a bong sitting in the hallway. A police search of the room revealed marijuana seeds, a glass bowl containing marijuana, a brass bowl containing marijuana residue and a marijuana cigarette.

Henry pled guilty to possession of marijuana. A related charge of possession of drug paraphernalia was dismissed.

NO LICENSE, ALTERED INSPECTION CHARGED

Dallas resident Stanley Egan, 31, was arrested April 24 by Dallas Borough patrolman William Norris after police observed that Egan's inspection sticker was taped to his windshield.

He was charged with displaying an altered inspection sticker and driving with a suspended license.
