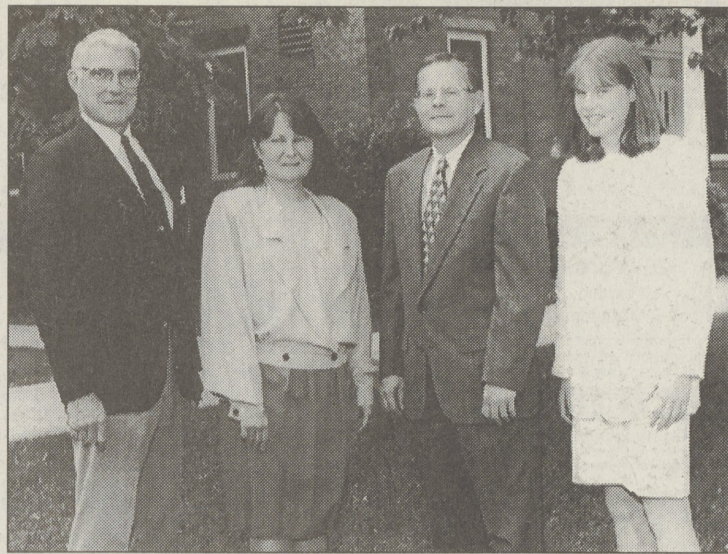
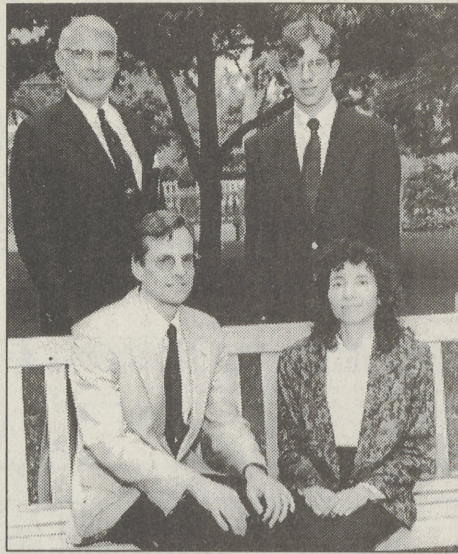
### Gennifer Pauley earns awards

The National Youth Leadership Forum develops and conducts annual Forums on Medicine, Law, and Defense, Intelligence & Diplomacy.

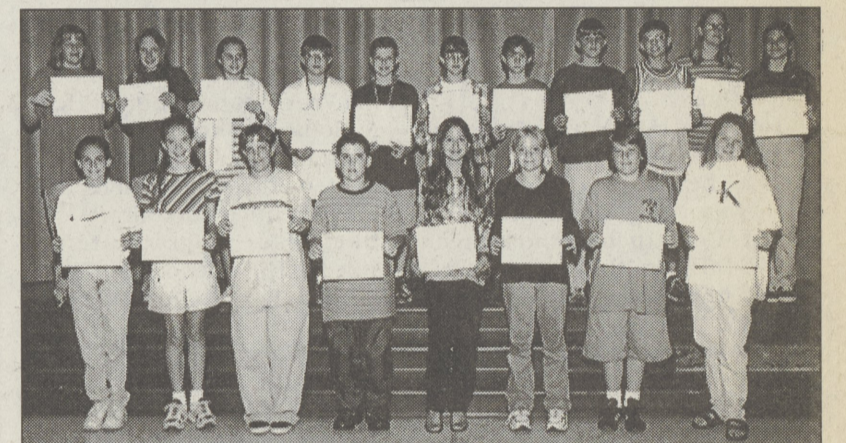
Many students are nominated to participate in these Forums by high school teachers and guidance counselors.
