'Another Antigone' at Kirby Park July 23-25

Take an award winning playwright's spin on a classic Greek tragedy which involves political correctness and anti-Semitism, add an award winning theatre troupe known for the off-beat and taking chances and sprinkle on the ambience of theatre outdoors under the stars, and you have a recipe for a delicious weekend of theatre.



Another Antigone to be performed at Kirby Park July 23 - 25

The playwright is A.R. Gurney, who has given us *Love Letters* and *The Cocktail Hour*. The work to be performed is *Another Antigone*. It is a serio-comic piece set on a college campus in Boston. The play centers on Judy Miller, a college senior who has written an updated *Antigone* set during the nuclear arms race. It also centers on Henry Harper, her professor, who will not grade it because he considers it a "heresy" and "a juvenile polemic". Although she won't graduate because of it, she decides to have it performed, thus setting the stage for both characters to symbolically follow the same paths as *Antigone* and Creon. Judy becomes more and

more obsessed with her play that it threatens her graduation, her job waiting for her, and her relationship with her boyfriend, Dave

for its wide range of productions, from serious drama, such as *The Shadow Box* and *Oedipus Rex*, to its recent one-act spoofs of different playwrights. *The Hysteria* of *Western Theatre*.
