## Millington attends week-long program on full scholarship

Segan Millington, daughter of Mark and Kathy Millington, a junior at Dallas High School has been granted a full scholarship to attend Pennsylvania Free Enterprise Week 1998 on the campus of Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pennsylvania.

Free Enterprise Week is a week-long, national award-winning economic education program offering students and teachers an inside look at the private enterprise system and how the free market functions.

Segan will attend one of the four one-week sessions offered this summer. Approximately 1,100 students and 30 teachers from across the Commonwealth have received scholarships, which cover

the cost of room, board, materials and scheduled activities. Funds for scholarships are contributed by businesses or community organizations on a county-by-county basis. Scholarships that are donated in a county are awarded to a student or teacher within that county.

Participants will join with business people to experience the challenge of competition through a business management simulation. They will assume the roles of top management for fictitious companies.

In addition to the management simulation, participants will hear top business leaders discussing topics such as business ethics, the stock market, and careers in business.

Previewing life on a college campus and making new friends all add to the excitement of Pennsylvania Free Enterprise Week.

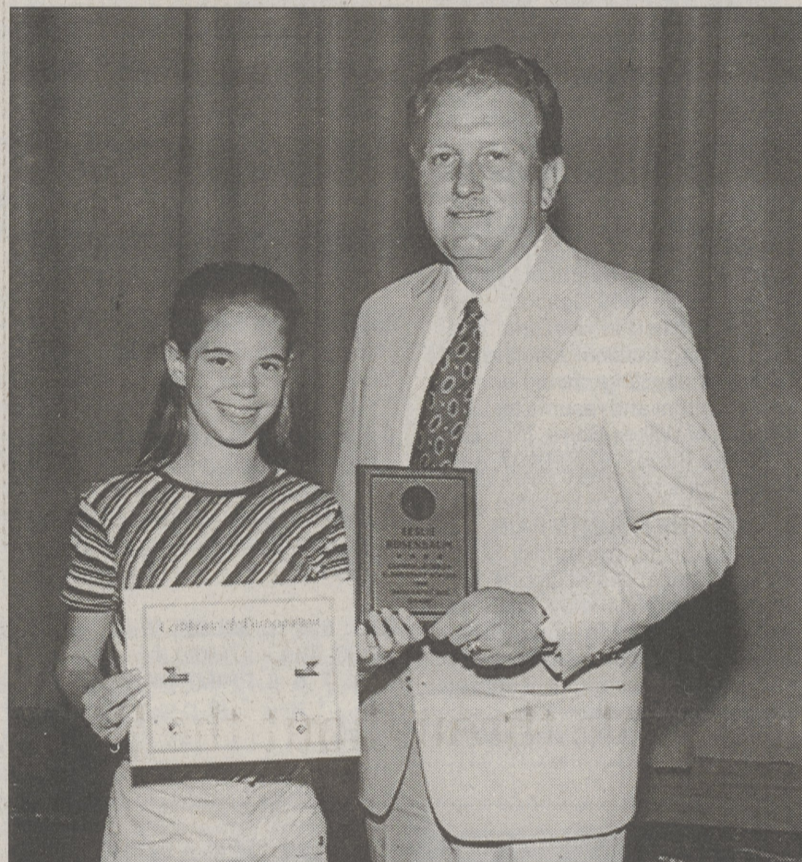
## Student Exchange now accepting applications for host families

American Intercultural Student Exchange is accepting applications from families who are interested in hosting a high school age foreign exchange student for the upcoming school year. Families may choose to host a student for one or two semesters. These high school students, all proficient in the English language, will arrive in the United States in August and attend high schools while living as members of their American host families. All AISE students have completed a lengthy screening and interview process with representatives in their home countries and come highly recommended by their English teachers.

Host families provide students with a bed, meals and a loving family atmosphere. The students

all have medical insurance and spending money for the duration of their stay. Families and students are provided with a representative that is available to answer questions and provide counseling support throughout the exchange experience.

Each year, thousands of families across the United States host AISE exchange students. AISE currently works with high school students from over 40 countries worldwide. AISE is a nationwide, non-profit educational foundation dedicated to the belief that foreign student exchange is a vital step toward peace among all nations. 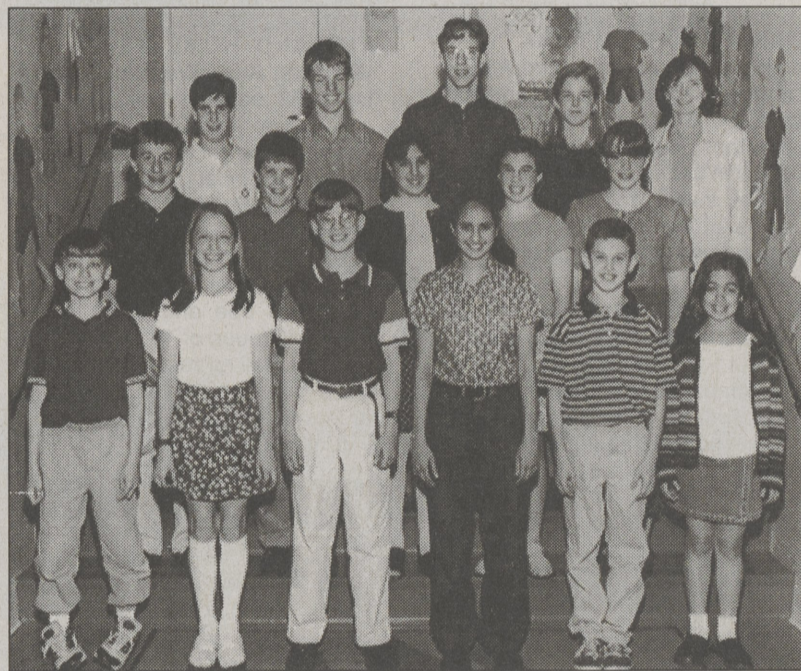


### Rosenbaum wins geography bee
