

Pat Rosenthal wins National Merit Scholarship Competition

Recent Wyoming Seminary graduate Patrick Rosenthal of Shavertown was announced a winner in the 43rd Annual National Merit Scholarship Competition, offered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation of Evanston, IL. This \$2,000 award, sponsored by the Bristol-Myers Squibb Company, was one of only five given nationally.



PATRICK ROSENTHAL

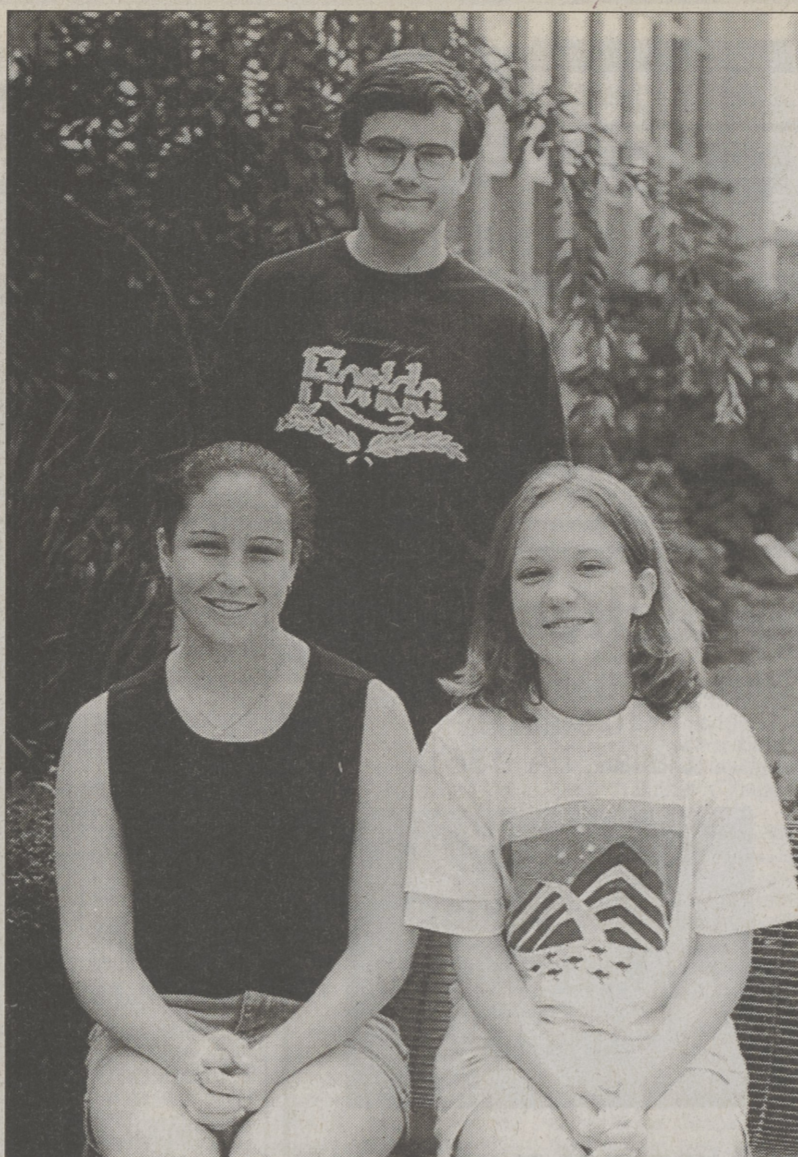
Rosenthal, son of Bruce and Beth Rosenthal of Shavertown was named as a winner on the basis of his performance on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Exam, in which over one million high school students participated in 1996. Also considered was Rosenthal's exemplary academic record, personal accomplishments, contributions to school and community, PSAT/NMSQT and SAT I scores, a student essay, and the recommendation of Wyoming Seminary.

Rosenthal was a high honors

dean's list student, having maintained his high average while taking three Advanced Placement college courses in his senior year. In addition, he played trumpet in Sem's orchestra, was layout editor and wrote for the school newspaper, the *Opinator*, and was a member of the Model United Nations team.

He has won numerous awards and honors during his high school career, including being named to the Cum Laude Society, receiving the Lindsley Morgan Washburn Prize in Mathematics, the President's Education Award, the Frederick Rudolph Prize for Historical Writing, the Wyoming Seminary Model United Nations Award, Advanced Placement Scholar Award, National Latin Examination honors, and was named to the Who's Who Among American High School Students. Rosenthal was also a member of the Junior Leadership Wilkes-Barre Class of 1996.

This summer, Rosenthal is studying abroad at Trinity College in Dublin, Ireland, and then will attend Duke University in the fall where he was admitted early decision.



Young Scholars from Back Mountain

Dr. Hinchey graduated cum laude from Wilkes University with a B.A. in English education and an M.S. in English education. She earned her Ed.D. in English education from Teachers College, Columbia University.

Prior to joining the Penn State Worthington Scranton faculty, Dr. Hinchey was assistant chair of the Department of Languages, Literature, and Social Studies at Columbia University's Teachers College in New York. While at Columbia, she worked closely with renowned English educator Lucy McCormick Calkins to direct field experiences and master's programs in English education.

She has also previously served as instructor of English at Penn State's Worthington Scranton Campus and Wilkes-Barre Campus, College Misericordia and Luzerne County Community College.

Dr. Hinchey is consulting editor for the national journal *The Clearing House*, has served as consultant to public schools and has spoken and written on English education and teacher education in several state and national forums. She belongs to several professional and scholarly societies, including the American Education Research Association and Association of Teacher Educators. *Finding Freedom in the Classroom - A Practical Introduction to Critical Theory*, written by Dr. Hinchey, was released this spring by Peter Lang Publishing, Inc., an international firm.

She is also co-editor of a collection of essays dealing with cognition and education, which will appear later this year from Garland Press.
