# Chris Scharff's coaching odyssey leads to Mountaineers

**DALLAS** - New Dallas soccer head coach Chris Scharff has been working his way up the local soccer ranks the past few years. Over a five-year span, he has held the titles of junior high head coach, assistant coach at a Division 2 high school, head coach at a Division 2 school, assistant at a Division 1 program, and now finally head coach of the Dallas Moun-

taineers, who compete in Division

Scharff started out five years ago as Lake-Lehman Junior High head coach. He was then part of the Bishop O'Reilly boys' soccer program for three years, serving as an assistant coach in his first year at the Division 2 school, followed by two years as the head coach. After a year off Scharff went back into coaching locally, this time as an assistant coach at Wyoming Valley West. Then, ear-

lier this year Dallas coach John McCafferty opted against coming back, the spot became available and Scharff jumped all over it.

Scharff, along with many of his players and supporters of Dallas soccer, are very optimistic about

the Mountaineers' chances this season. The team, which took a tough 1-0 loss to Lehman last season in the district final, lost only two key seniors to graduation. Last year's Mountaineer squad was also the only team in

the entire state to defeat Coughlin, the team which won the AAA PIAA state soccer title.

"This team is really well-rounded," Scharffsaid. "With last year's returning starters, with the players who came in as reserves last year, we're expecting major accomplishments and a lot of dedication from everyone."

Scharff's optimism is so great that his players are responding very well to his coaching style and enthusiasm. He himself played two years in Boca Raton, Florida so he knows what playing is like and the absolute necessity to have a complete player at each posi-



# Misericordia names new women's basketball coach

Jeanne Dupree of Gloversville, NY, has been named coordinator of athletic facilities and head coach of women's basketball at College Misericordia, Misericordia athletic director Dr. Michael Mould has announced.

"I'm please to welcome Jeanne to our staff," said Mould. "She has had success in everything she has undertaken. She was an outstanding player and student and enjoyed a fine experience as an assistant coach."

Dupree spent the last three years as an assistant coach at SUNY-Cortland where she also served as instructor in physical education.

"I'm excited about the opportunity to be a head coach and to be at Misericordia," said Dupree.
"The situation here is ideal for me. I had a tremendous experience as a student-athlete and, as a coach, I hope to provide that same opportunity to student-athletes."

Dupree will apply the knowledge she has acquired throughout her basketball career which included four years as the starting point guard at Division II LeMoyne College. "I've learned a lot about the game as a player, an

assistant coach and through coaching experiences at various camps," she explained. "I'm anxious to put that knowledge to use."

She inherits a team that finished 13-12 and reached the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference semifinals a year ago. The Cougars have recorded six consecutive winning seasons and have made five straight playoff appearances.

"Jeanne's involvement here underscores the continued commitment to a strong women's basketball program at College Misericordia," said Mould.

In addition to her coaching duties, Dupree will be responsible for the coordination of events and maintenance of the Anderson Sports-Health Center and other athletic facilities.

Dupree earned a bachelor of arts in psychology from LeMoyne and added a bachelor of science in physical education from Cortland.

A dean's list student at LeMoyne and Cortland, she served as team captain as a junior and senior at LeMoyne. She holds the school records for assists in a season and career.
