Ed Narkiewicz says he's been coaching cross country at Lake-Lehman "since Adam and Eve." Well, maybe not that long, but he has been doing it since 1976.

In recent years, "Coach Nark" has twice put in notice that he might retire from his Earth and Space Science teaching spot at the high school, and each time has withdrawn. "I guess I found a place to be happy," he says. If they like winning, so have the members of his team.

Lake-Lehman has been undefeated the last two regular seasons, and is working on a streak of 14 victories. The going may get tougher this year, since District 2 now includes more than 20 schools, many

from the strong Lackawanna League. But with seven seniors on the nine-man squad, things look pretty good for at least one more season.

Most of the seniors have shared the glory of the past two seasons, and many of them have been running together since seventh grade. If Narkiewicz has favorites, he's not saying much. "It's tough to pick any out," he said. "They've all improved year to year and they're all running well."

Past experience tells him Joe Maskalis and the Lyons brothers, James and Jason, can be counted on. The newest addition, Tony Lumbis, has run track since junior high and is trying cross country for the first time.

The team trains early in the season by running 8-10 miles a day. Gradually they work down to a combination of two to three mile runs with one long run a week, eventually cutting the short runs to a mile and adding sprints for the finishing "kick."

Wyoming Area, Hanover, Nanticoke and Dallas will provide the greatest challenges, Narkiewicz thinks. "Our division has always been tough," he said.

20 boys competing to play

Losing eight seniors to graduation has put the Dallas golf team in a new position this fall. "We're really in a rebuilding program," said 15-year head coach Tom Kilduff.

The result, Kilduff said, is that more players will get to compete, as he tries to sort out his best combination. "I'm trying to give a bunch of guys a chance to play," Kilduff said.

Twenty boys turned out for this year's squad, but no girls. Kilduff says the same thing happened when he coached tennis in the past, the best female athletes were involved in cheerleading or field hockey in the fall, and couldn't find time for golf.

The team has only two seniors, Chuck Fehlinger and T.J. Amico. The rest of the squad is comprised of four freshmen, and seven each of sophomores and juniors.

Six players compete in each nine-hole match, and the lowest scores of the top four players are added to make a team total. In the event of a tie the fifth and sixth scores can come into play. That means more than a dozen players will sit out each of the team's 15 matches, but it won't be the same all the time.

"I told them I'll rotate several players in and out," Kilduff said.

Where eight or nine players usually see match play in a season, this year a 12 or more may get to test themselves when it

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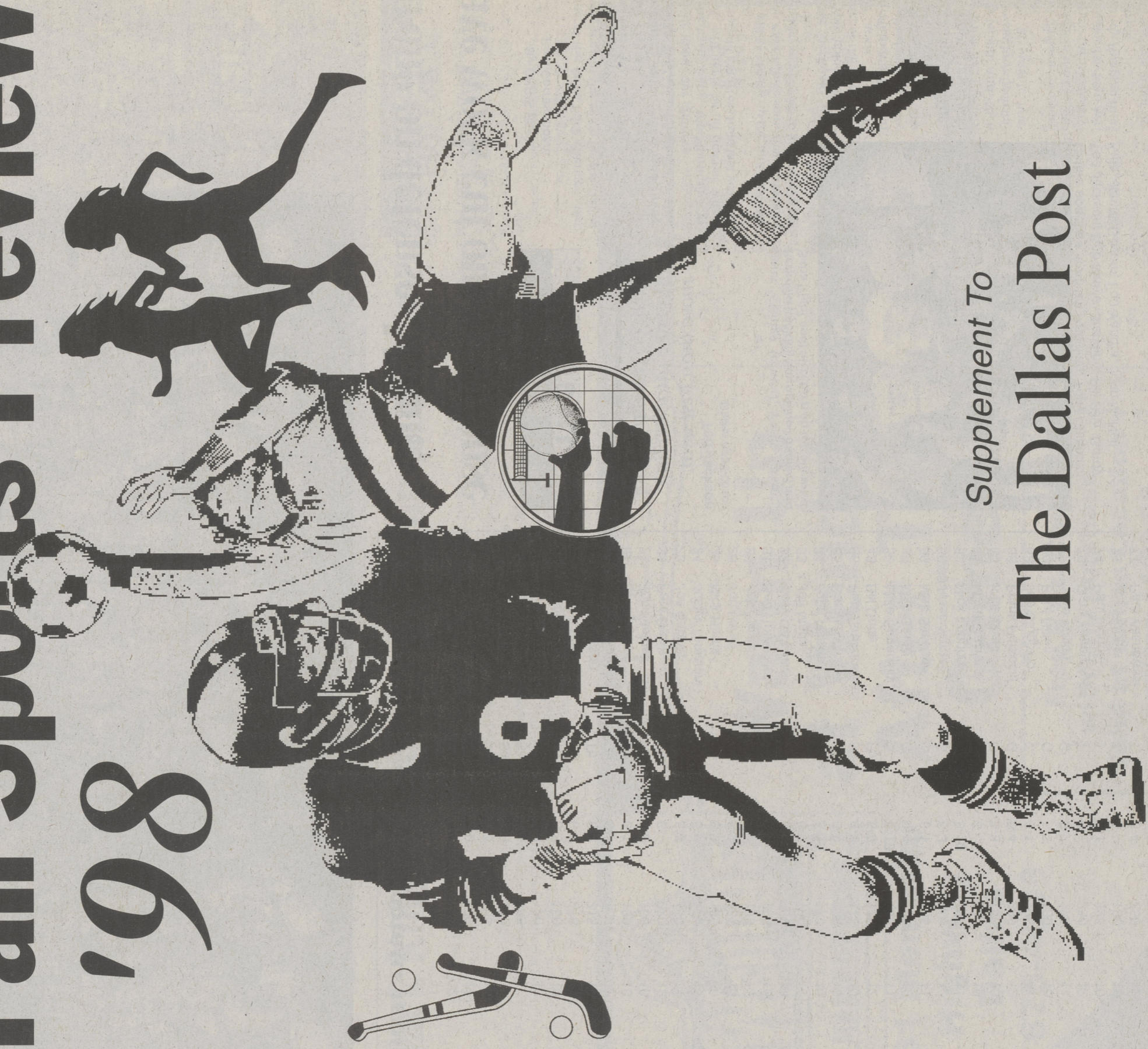
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
