The implantable device is an ultrasonic sensor for monitoring the condition of a vascular graft and was developed by Back Mountain resident Dr. Cimochowski together with George W. Keilman, Ph.D., of Seattle, Washington. "In essence, the sensor, which will be implanted under the skin, will measure the blood flow in a patient's vessels and grafts and transmit that information via a wireless radio link to a small, portable monitor that analyzes and records the data," explains Dr. Cimochowski. "That information provides timely insight into a patient's condition and can be used to compare any prior patient

Previous to the invention of this device, blood flow could only be checked through cardiac catherization. "Now patients will have that information monitored simply and without surgery such as an invasive procedure-right in their physician's office," adds Dr. Cimochowski.

"This reduces all pain and risks to the patient, and eliminates the costs associated with an invasive procedure.

The implantable ultrasonic sensor is currently under development and will be made available by VascuSense. Inc., a new medical devise company.
