Lake-Lehman seasons end at hands of eventual state champions

Soccer falls to ELCO

Eastern Lebanon County (ELCO) stopped Lake-Lehman's bid for a state championship Nov. 18, beating the Black Knights 4-0. The teams had played early in pre-season, and came away on the short end of a 3-2 score. The statistics, except

for the score, were close. Lehman had 11 shots to ELCO's 10, and two corners to one. But the Black Knights' defense gave up more goals than it had in a game all season, while the offense couldn't get untracked and was kept scoreless for only the second time.

The loss put an end to a

magnificent season for the Knights, in which they went 23-1-1 in the regular season and won the district title for the second consecutive year.

ELCO went on to win the Class AA state championship by beating Quaker Valley 2-1 Nov. 20.

Hockey comes up short against unbeaten Southern Lehigh

In 1996, it was a happy occasion every time the Lake-Lehman field hockey team returned from a playoff game. And things seemed to be going the same way this year, until the Knights met Southern

Lehigh Nov. 18.

Lehman, which had beaten WVC rival Crestwood twice in the regular season, and would have faced the Comets again. It had both teams won their playoff games, met its match in Southern Lehigh, which came into the game unbeaten in 26 games. The score was 1-1 at the

half, with Janelle Perlis firing in an unassisted goal to knot the score near the end of the period, but Lehman couldn't answer the next Southern Lehigh goal. It might have been worse; Colby Smith stopped 24 Spartans' shots in goal.

Southern Lehigh then beat Line Mountain for the AA title.

Pace Phys. Ther. 38 - Burger King 27



InterMetro Industries 44 - NAPA Auto Parts 25


