Rec park may meet need for sport fields

BACK MOUNTAIN - Unsure of continued access to the fields where youngsters have played for 38 years, Back Mountain Baseball Inc. is on the lookout for a new home. At the same time, Back Mountain Recreation Inc., the newly-incorporated body attempting to create a joint recreation

park, may have just the spot. BMT Baseball officials are concerned that once the Dallas School District moves its administrative offices to the main school campus, it will sell the land along Church St. in Dallas, which the fields occupy along with the administration building and the old Dallas Township school. They're also uncertain whether a proposed regional recreation center will meet the needs of the league's 1,000 plus players.

The league's questions may be


