Reconstituted Reelers ready to play at contra dance

The April contra dance at St. Therese's Church will feature the sounds of the Back Mountain Reelers.

The popular local group will have a new look as they perform for the first time following a two-year hiatus. A delightful mix of familiar and new musicians combine to produce a zesty blend of Appalachian, Celtic, and English dance tunes.

The Reelers have played at numerous regional venues and have performed on the WVIA-FM program "Home Grown Music." The band features Mary Blanc and Brian Redmond on fiddle, Paul Mehl and Roger Redmond playing banjos and Mary Mehl at the piano. This talented group will provide an evening of upbeat rhythms for dancers to enjoy.

Participants form two lines the length of the dance floor, as the contra program begins. Men alternate with women along the row and partners stand across from each other. Many dance steps are similar to square dancing and a few, such as the swing, originate from ballroom dance. Many dancers use a walking step, though experienced contra partners may be comfortable dancing at a vigorous pace.

No partner or experience is necessary to join in the fun. Dancers should wear soft-soled shoes and comfortable, lightweight clothing. Those planning to attend are asked to bring a snack to share during the intermission.

The dance will be held Saturday, April 10 beginning at 8 p.m. It is sponsored by the Folklore Society of Northeast PA and the Chicory House. Tickets are \$6 for adults, \$5 for members, \$3 for children and \$15 for families. For more information, contact David Martin at 333-4007.
