able products.

There is some relief from the weather woes. Some farmers are able irrigate crops to ensure continued growth in dry weather and to stave off dramatic losses. "Well, I have to irrigate because blueberries need water - at least an inch a week," said Jimmy Sickler, who owns the Sickler Berry Farm. "It's tough but it could be worse; we have a ton of berries this year and they are very good. In fact my daughter just picked a bucket of them for pie.

Fortunately, for farmers and consumers, other local growers also report crops are not suffering from the dry weather. "Right at this point, everything looks great," said Ted Dymond, who runs Dymond's Farm and Dymond's Farm Store. "Our strawberries were a little smaller than in other years, but we have six or seven acres of fruit trees and another 30 acres of corn planted and so far they are in good shape.'

While the fruits and vegetables are thriving under sunny skies, this summer's above average temperatures present another problem for farmers. "It's miserable," said Norm Darling, who along with his father operates the Darling Farms in Dallas and Plains. "The guys don't even want to work and the truth is I can't blame them. Nobody's happy to be out in the field when it's 100 degrees and humid like it has been.

A local dairy farm employs a combination of strategies to remain competitive. Hillside Farms operates a greenhouse and a dairy store featuring milk and ice cream produced by the farm's 60 to 65 milking cows. "The cows aren't real happy this summer - they prefer cool temperatures." said Will Conyngham, whose family owns Hillside Farms. "But in this heat, the ice cream is really moving.

One loyal customer, who brought two young boys to the dairy for some ice cream, said she prefers Hillside's products to those she can find in the supermarket. "I always come out here for milk,' aid Barbara Houlihan, "I think


