"Of course, we had a school newspaper which was quite efficient for what it was and we had a nice band. The dime dances are especially memorable to me because we just had such a good time together. We were a small group but we certainly had

fun. Despite all the changes this group has endured over the years, they are ready to have fun together once again. "We were born just as the Depression was getting started and we lived through that," said O'Boyle. "Then we went right into the whole thing with the World War II and later we had Korea and Vietnam and all the others. I think most of us feel we belong to a real group of experienced veterans and it would be nice to catch up with everyone and share some of our stories."


