

Wilkes University congratulates 19 graduates and alumni who were recently accepted into professional schools in health sciences.



Jackson Twp. gets aid for police vests

Congressman Paul E. Kanjorski (PA-11) today announced that Jackson Township was among 23 communities in the 11th Congressional District taht will receive \$102,059 in federal funding to help purchase bulletproof vests for their law enforcement officers. Jackson Township will receive \$3,962 to purchase 10 vests.

"I co-sponsored the law that created this program in 1998, and

I am now a co-sponsor of legislation to carry out President Clinton's request to extend and double the authorized funding for this program from \$75 million to \$150 million over the next three years," Kanjorski said. "This legislation would also guarantee that the program will pay for 50 percent of the costs of bulletproof vests for communities of less than 100,000 people."
