The Performing Arts Institute of Wyoming Seminary will present a variety of free programs this July 21-23 which will highlight choral, instrumental, orchestral, and dance performances.

The Guest Artist Series will feature "Meet the Composer; The Music of Bruce Reiprich" July 21 at 8 p.m. The lecture-recital will be held at The Great Hall, 228 Wyoming Ave. Kingston, just north of Kingston Corners. A former faculty member of the Oberlin College Conservatory of Music and Wilkes University, Reiprich is currently on the faculty of Northern Arizona University where he teaches music theory and composition to both undergraduate and graduate students.

The evening program will be hosted by Victor Liva, also a faculty member at Northern Arizona University, where he conducts the orchestra and teaches violin. Mr. Liva is a doctoral candidate at the University of South Carolina (ABD) and holds degrees from Wilkes University and Temple University.

Saturday's concert at 8 p.m. will also be held at The Great Hall. John M. Vaida, Chairman of the Fine Arts Department at Wyoming Seminary, will conduct the Masterworks Chorale and the Institute Chorus. Under his leadership, the Wyoming Seminary choral program has developed into one of the leading independent school programs in the eastern United States.

The Chamber Orchestra will perform Benjamin Britten's Simple Symphony" under the direction of Victor Liva. Completing the concert will be the Symphony Orchestra, under the baton of Maestro Kenneth Jernigan, performing works by Franz Liszt, Dmitri Kabalevsky, and Giuseppe Verdi. Mark Kratz, a junior at the Eastman School of Music, and a counselor at PAI, will be the guest soloist. He will sing the tenor aria, "Se' miei bollenti spiriti" from Verdi's opera La Traviata.

Dr. Yavorski performs all Vascular procedures to include angioplasty and endovascular graft placement and performs over 100 aneurysms per year, including angioscopic side branch occlusion for insitu distal graphs. He also performs carotid artery angioplasty/stenting for indicated patients.

Dr. Yavorski and his wife, Sandra, live in Shavertown with their two children.
