School districts can get funds for new teachers, training

School districts in the Back Mountain will be eligible for some of an estimated \$1.28 million in federal funding available to districts in Luzerne County to hire new teachers to reduce class sizes in the 2000-01 school year.

"Smaller class sizes mean teachers can provide more personal attention to students and spend less time on discipline. This funding is especially important with the continuing concern over property taxes in Pennsylvania," said Congressman Paul Kanjorski.

The state Department of Education, which distributes the federal money, estimates that local school districts will be eligible for the following amounts of funding for the coming school year: Dallas \$59,498 Lake-Lehman \$47,183

Allocations to local school districts are based on total enrollment and the number of low-income children in each district. The funds are primarily used to hire additional teachers next year for kindergarten through third grade or to fund the salaries of teachers already hired under this program. Up to 25 percent of the funds may be spent on professional development of teachers.
