'Medicinal Purpose' the aim of dance band

A New England Contra dance sponsored by the Chicory House and the Folklore Society will feature Lancaster caller Shane Knudsen and the band "Medicinal Purpose." The event occurs on Saturday, Oct. 14, starting at 8 p.m. at St. Therese's Catholic Church, Pioneer Ave., Shavertown.

Medicinal Purpose includes Ryck Kaiser on fiddle, Jamie Williams, guitar and Henry Koretzky on mandolin and hammered dulcimer. Henry describes the band's music as "A fusion of the southern old-time tunes popular at dances below the Mason-Dixon line, and the Celtic and French-Canadian tunes more popular at New England contradances. Our Pennsylvania location and diverse musical backgrounds of the band members give us a distinctive mix."

The dancing is energetic and involves mixing with the other dancers as each couple performs a short routine with another couple before progressing onto the next couple and repeating the sequence. It shares some elements with square dancing such as "swing your partner" and "do-si-do", but the couples form long lines rather than squares. Contra dancing is easy, mostly involving a smooth walking step. A different routine is taught before each dance by a caller who has everyone "walk through" the dance while explaining it.

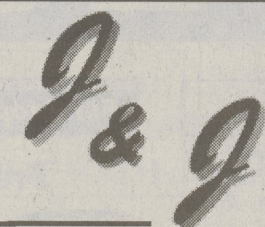
