State expands eligibility for children's health insurance

els for the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) mean more PA children are eligible for free or low-cost health coverage.

CHIP offers free or subsidized health insurance to children from working families that don't qualify for medical assistance and don't have private insurance. Current enrollment exceeds 106,000. In the past seven years, enrollments for CHIP have increased by more than 133 percent.

Eligibility is based on family size and income. Children of families earning up to 200 percent of the federal income poverty guidelines, or \$35,300 for a family of four, may be eligible for free cov-Low-cost insurance is

Expanded income eligibility lev- available for children of families earning up to 235 percent of the guidelines, or \$41,478 for a family of four.

CHIP covers a variety of health benefits, including dental, vision and hearing services; emergency care; prescription drugs; immunizations; diagnostic testing; and routine check-ups. Coverage has also been expanded to include substance abuse treatment, rehabilitation therapy, medical equipment, home health care and partial hospitalization for mental health services.
