Concert has been an active member in Adopt-a-Roadway service. He has worked on both Republican and Democrat and other parties' campaigns, believes his age is a factor.

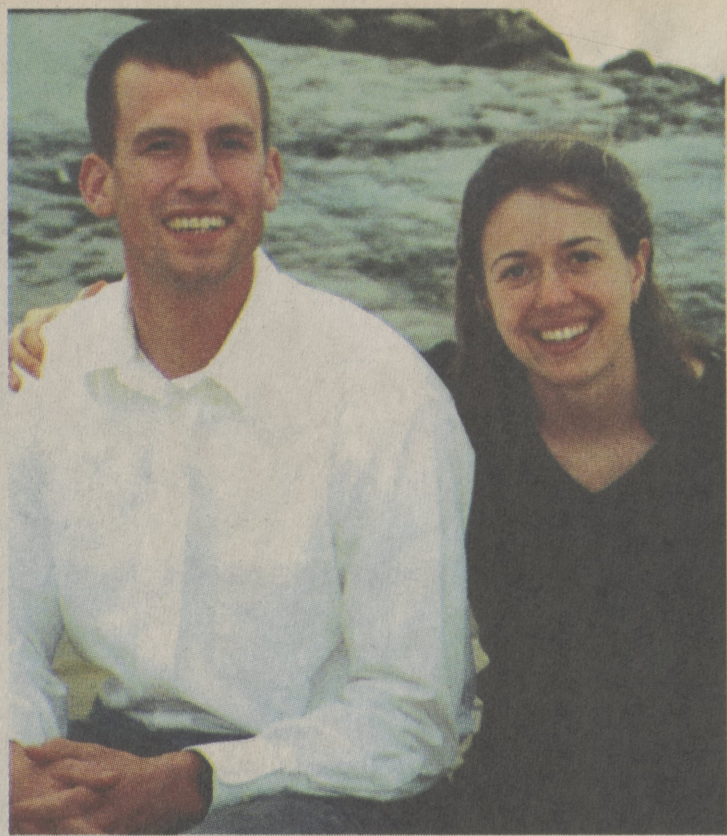
He supports finding additional funding to help the Kingston Twp. Ambulance Association, Shavertown and Trucksville Fire Departments and Kingston Twp. Police Department.

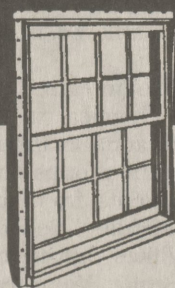
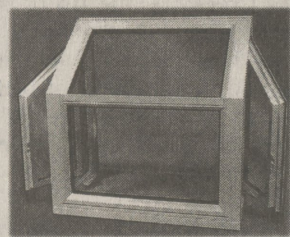
