yearly mammogram.

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Women age 40 and older should have a screening mammogram every year, according to the American Cancer Society (ACS). Between the ages of 20 and 39, women should have a clinical breast examination by a health professional a minimum of every three years. Health care sionals agree the informa tion is out there regarding why women should have mammograms, but for one reason or another not all women who should

have mammograms do.

This year Blue Cross of Northeastern Pennsylvania teamed up with the ACS's Tell-a-Friend program. "The program takes the peer counseling approach," said Judy Bouthot, Shavertown, Blue Cross of NEPA quality management and improvement manager. The Tell-a-Friend program ad-

"People respond better sometimes when hearing they should go from another source than a doctor," said Gina Klepadlo, Blue Cross of NEPA quality improvement coordinator.

"The program is a coordinated effort with ACS. The ACS kicked the Tell-a-Friend program off last year," Bouthot said.


