This company was one of the most requested arts groups listed on the roster of Pennsylvania Performing Arts on Tour. Potato pancakes, halushki, and pierogi will be available for purchase, as well as snow cones and Hillside Dairy ice cream. All payment must be post-marked on or before Sept. 17 to be eligible for the rebate.
