Lake-Lehman 2, Meyers 1

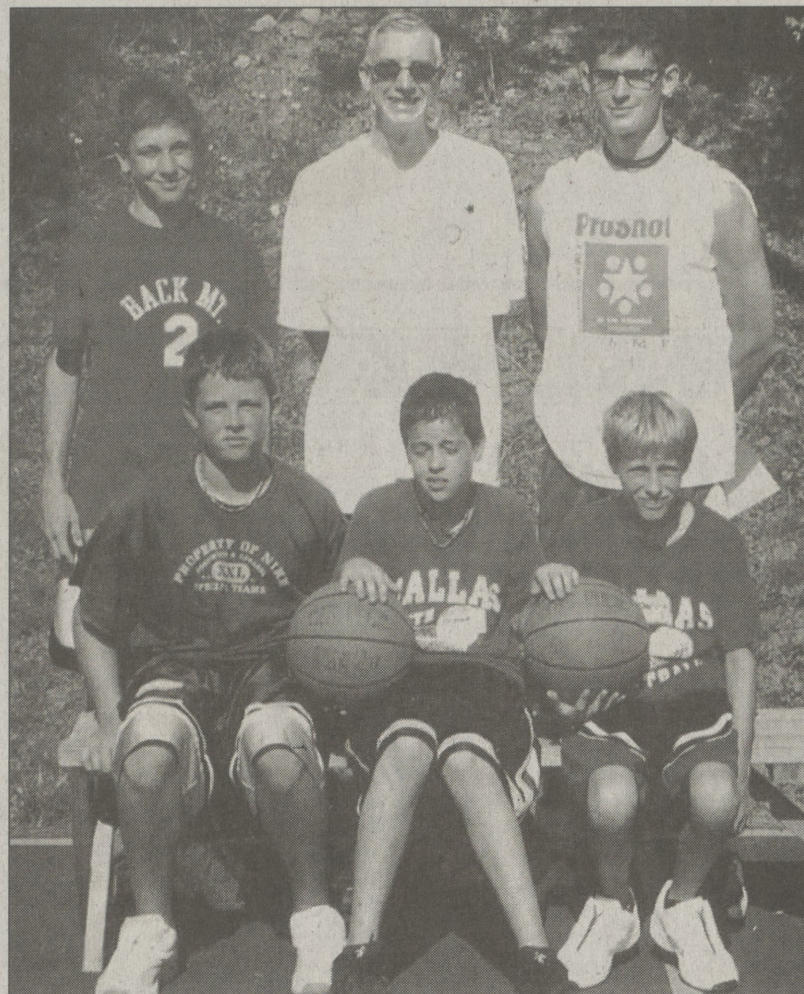
