As part of the Pennsylvania Game Commission's efforts to highlight its ongoing habitat improvement initiatives, the public is invited to take part in tours of State Game Lands.

On Sept. 30. Registration will be from 7:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. at the headquarters building complex Ricketts Station, Forkston Twp., Wyoming County. As part of the tour, the game Commission has developed a voluntary scavenger hunt to help educate the public about food sources for wildlife in the area. Game Commission personnel will be on hand to explain various points of interest, including wildlife habitat improvement projects. Four-wheel-drive vehicles are recommended for this three-hour, 30-mile, self-guided driving tour.

Directions: take Route 487 north at intersection of Route 118 and proceed 7.5 miles and turn onto a dirt road near State Game Land sign on right. Travel on dirt road 1/10 mile to a Y intersection and proceed left 3/10 miles to the headquarters complex. Each vehicle will be provided a map and brief explanation of wildlife management programs being carried out on this magnificent tract of public hunting land.
