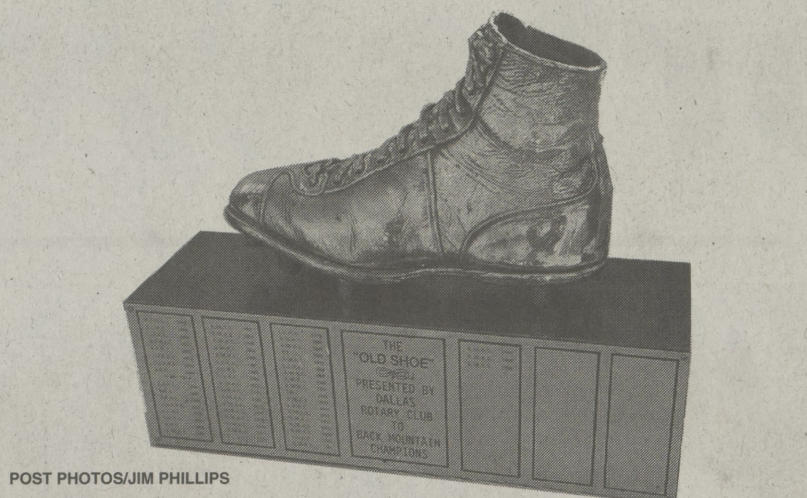
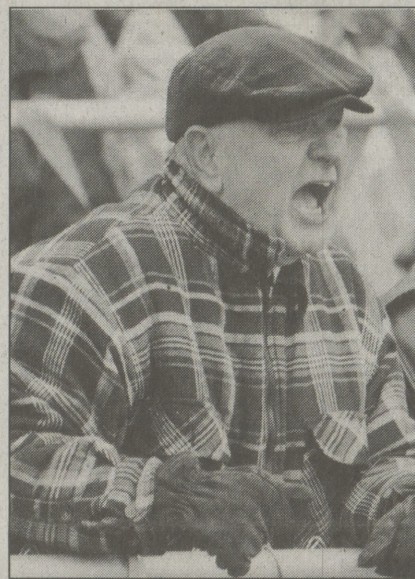
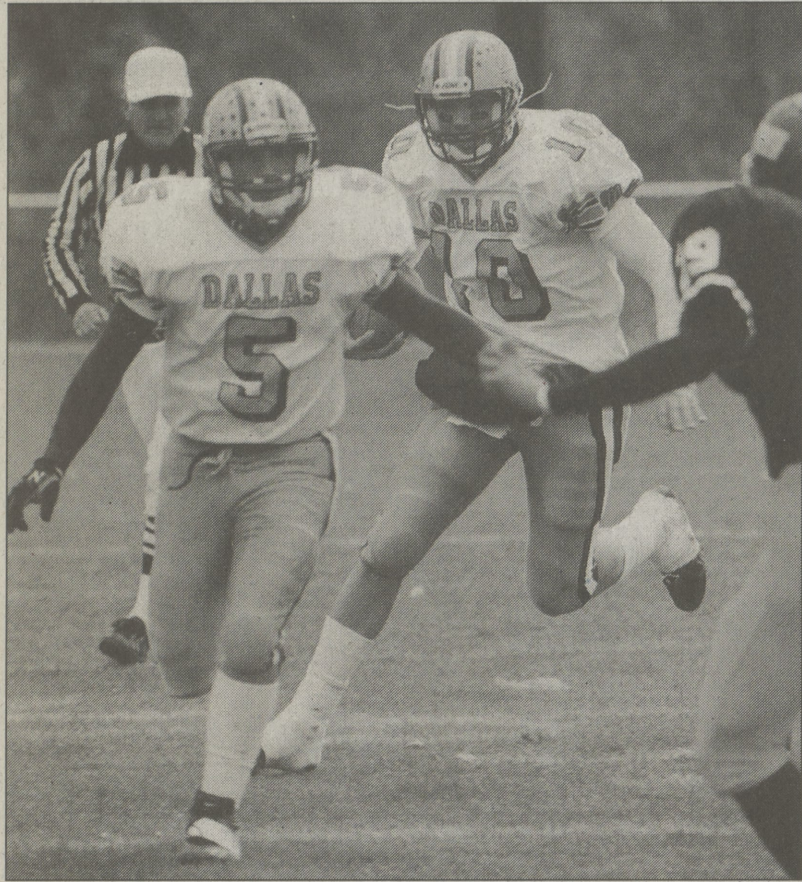


'Old Shoe' scenes

Game Commission youth essay contest deadline approaching

Young hunters ages 12 to 18 from throughout Pennsylvania are reminded all entries for the Pennsylvania Game Commission's Youth Essay Contest must be postmarked no later than Nov. 30, 2001.

The theme for the contest is: "Ways that I can promote hunting." The prize list features grand-prize winners in the junior (ages 12-15) and senior (ages 16-18) divisions taking expense-paid trips to Texas and Wyoming.

The junior division grand-prize recipient will attend Safari Club International's (SCI) Apprentice Hunter Camp at the YO Ranch in Texas. The senior division grand-prize winner will receive a scholarship to SCI's American Wilderness Leadership School in Jackson, Wyoming. Both of these prizes are being sponsored by the Pennsylvania Chapters of Safari Club International.

First prize in the junior division will be a scholarship to the National Wild Turkey Federation's Conservation Field Day event in Edgefield, South Carolina. The first-prize winner in the senior division will receive a scholarship to Penn State University's Conservation Leadership school program at the Stone Valley Recreation Area near State College. Both of these prizes are being sponsored by the Pennsylvania Chapters of the National Wild Turkey Federation.

Prizes for entries finishing in second through fourth place in each division will include: two-day youth pheasant hunt at a western Pennsylvania game preserve, including overnight accommodations; a Thompson-Center flintlock rifle; a Lyman flintlock rifle; and Sightron binoculars. All entries receive a Game Commission "Working Together for Wildlife" embroidered patch.

Other prize sponsors are the Pennsylvania Deer Association; H&R 1871, Inc.; Marlin; and Sightron Optics.

Entrants must be Pennsylvania residents, have successfully completed an accredited hunter-trapper education course and possess a current hunting or furtaker license.

Entries must include the following information: full name; mailing address with zip code; telephone number and area code; year, state and county where hunter-trapper education course was successfully completed; current hunting or furtaker license number; and age and date of birth.

Frances Slocum deer hunt Dec. 3

The state Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) will conduct a regulated deer hunt at Frances Slocum State Park, Luzerne County, December 3, to help control the deer population within the park.

The one-day hunt is for whitetail deer only, and will be conducted in areas not normally open to hunting. To ensure the safety of all park visitors, the park will be closed to all other activities this day.

To participate, hunters must hold an unexpired Luzerne county antlerless license. Only manually operated shotguns 20 gauge or larger, or muzzleloading firearms will be allowed.

The hunt will be limited to the first 40 hunters that arrive at the park starting at 6 a.m., and will not be chosen by lottery drawing as previous years.

Safety zones, no hunting areas, and park boundaries will be posted and strictly enforced. Extra park rangers and Pennsylvania Game Commission personnel will be stationed throughout the park area during this hunt.
