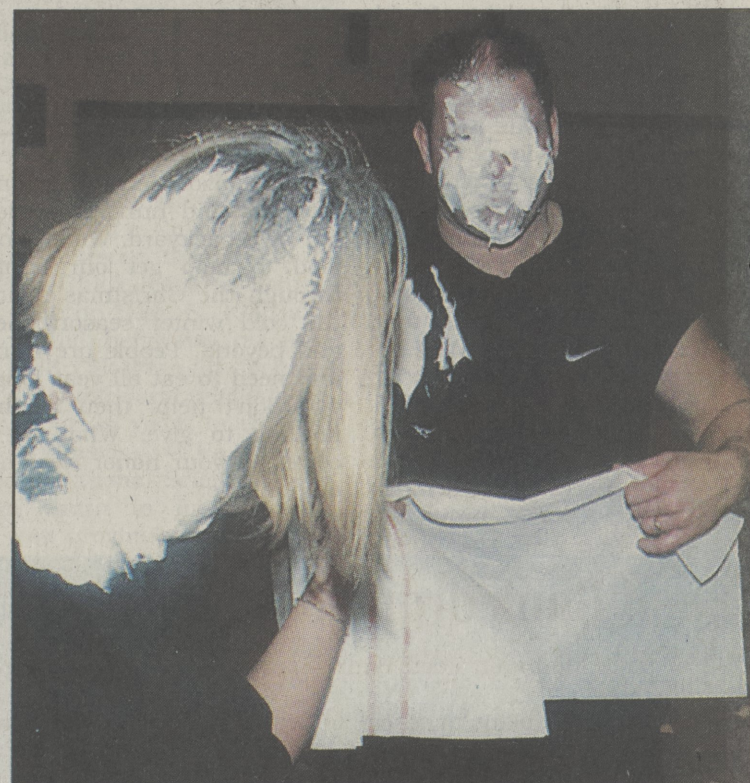

Jean Lipski's hair took on a new look, as she became a target after hitting Lois Kaschenbach.



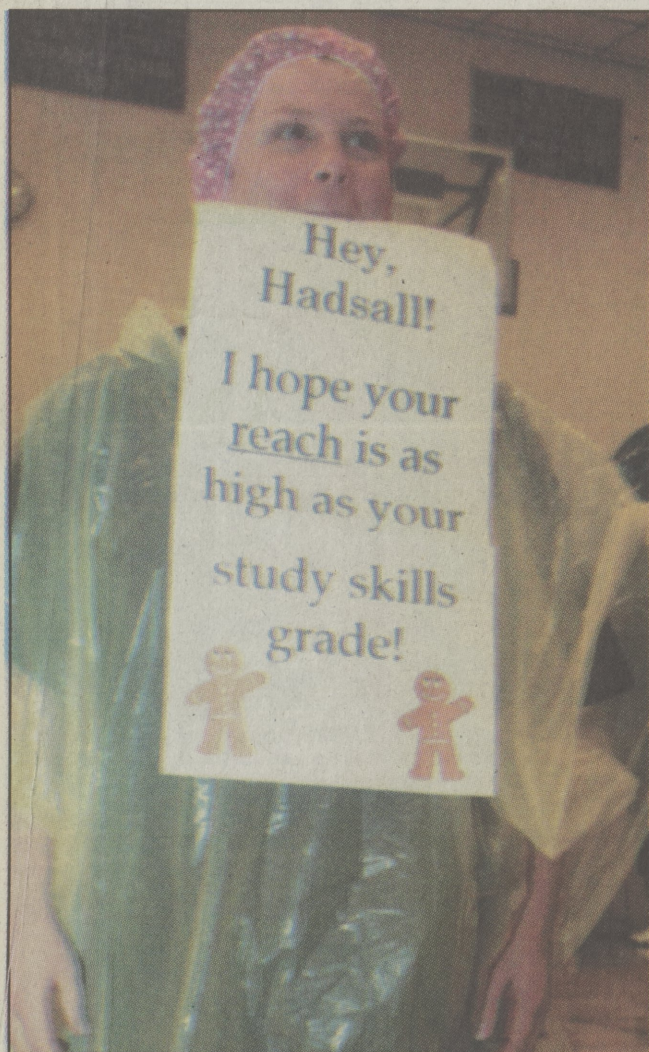
John Sobocinski called the celebration to order, or maybe disorder.
