

store to be finished by the end of

"We have talked to over twothirds of the people that we're trying to get the easements from and I would definitely say that of the 30 easements, we easily have 20. We'll probably have 25," added Rimple. "We don't have them in our hands right now, but we have talked to them. We have said, 'Would you please consider?' and they have said yes.

"They have been great partners." The success of the Back Mountain Trail is dependent upon these kinds of partnerships. "The cooperation and enthusiasm of properowners such as William Guyette, Ruth K. Smith, Bill Leandri and Luzerne National Bank who have granted easements of their property benefits the community," Rimple said. "It enhances the land. Allowing ASTA, the BMT Trail and the community to share use of their property benefits them in so many ways too.'

The trail is being developed in four sections (see maps), Stage One going from Edwardsville to Carverton Road, Trucksville is 6.2 miles long. The Luzerne Creek Walk and the Trucksville access of this stage are being designed by Tom McLane Associates with a Luzerne County grant.

Stage Two heads northward from Carverton Road 2.3 miles to

Lower Demunds Road in Dallas Borough.


Stage Three, the most complicated stage, runs 4.0 miles from Lower Demunds Road to Lake Street, Dallas Borough, and on to Carpenter Road in Dallas Town-

"College Misericordia is going to make a trail through their land so we can use their restrooms and their recreation fields," Rimple said. "It's a destination for us." College Misericordia has obtained a \$90,000 Transportation Enhancement Association (TEA) award to link their new outdoor sports complex to the trail.

Stage Four is 3.0 miles long extending from Carpenter Road to Harveys Lake.

The association obtained a TEA grant for \$480,000 to be used by 2005, to help in building the trail. The conditions of the grant include raising 20 percent (\$96,000) in matching local funds and obtaining right-of-way or easements from the 35 property owners. Easement land appraisals, deed work, volunteer efforts and inkind professional help qualify toward the match.
