HL dumping program through October

Harveys Lake Borough's yearly dumping program will continue on the last Saturday of each month through October from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, at the Borough Garage, off West Point Avenue. Permits are required to use the facility and may be purchased at the Borough Office Monday through Friday from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. Valid driver's licenses are required to obtain a permit. There is a fee of \$10 per month to dump. There is an additional charge of \$10 per "white appliance" and \$2 for each tire, off the rim.
